## Pomeroy asks for co-operation before upcoming hearings

Regional chairman, Peter Pomeroy, asked town councillors Monday evening to allow the longawaited garbage dump search to go ahead now that application has been made for that hearing by Halton.

He came to general committee Monday evening after delivering the same message to Burlington council earlier that night. He said that there has been so much disagreement that he hoped there could be some agreement on issues which serve the common good of Halton and the two affected municipalities-Milton and Burlington

He asked that all parties "agree that the public forum for airing and debating views on the matter will be the Consolidated Hearing. 'He asked" for agreement on taking steps to expediate the hearing including


