Terry Brandt, MMHA president, said "hopefully it's going to be a financial success. The only thing missing is the two Milton teams (there is no minor bantam or midget Milton team -- the Beaver is a minor tournament). That may drop the gate considerably."

the MMHA had not, to his knowledge, struck a deal with either the Milton Referees Association or the Town over ice time.

Last year, MMHA was charged substantially less than the going rate by the referees association. And last year, MMHA paid the town only \$50 per hour in ice fees for the tourna-

ment, down from the standard \$70. Tournament co-ordinator Bob Davidson said the referees association gave him a deal on the lower age levels, (novice, atom, peewee), charging less than Tri-County rates, while the association opted for regular Tri-County charges for bantam and midget. "That's a threeman (officiating) situation," Davidson explained.

Davidson added that negotiations with the Town over ice fees were ongoing.

Brandt said volunteers are still needed to man the timekeepers box throughout the tournament. There is a schedule of games at Memorial Arena and volunteers can pencil in when they will be available to help



One point is better than none

One point is better than no points. but it may well have been a fourpoint week for Milton Merchants in junior B hockey.

Merchants played two teams which they can expect to operate on the same level with, Georgetown Gemini and Mimico Monarchs, on the weekend. Milton managed a 4-4 tie with Gemini Friday at Memorial Arena. But Saturday in Mimico the hosts downed Milton 8-6.

Georgetown is one place ahead of Milton in the Central Jr. B standings, but Milton has small chance of catching Georgetown for sixth place overall. Gemini post 23 points to Milton's 14. Mimico and Milton have almost identical records, with Monarchs also clutching 14 points. In the battle for the basement Mimico took a round with the win Saturday, moving up to tie Milton, more or less, in the standings.

Monarchs have six wins to Milton's five in 28 starts. Milton has four ties to Mimico's two and both clubs have 20 losses. An argument could be made that such stats are almost meaningless because all eight clubs make the playoffs, but in another category the difference between Milton and Mimico is disturbing, from the Milton perspective.

Milton maintains a marginal lead

in goals for (109 to 104) but Merchants have 197 goals against while Monarchs have a paltry 161. In short this is the earthshaking conclusion part). Milton loses by bigger

margins than Mimico. So day in and lay out who is the better team? top coach Gerry Inglis maintains two primary points concerning the weekend's action. Inglis is not a great admirer of fighting in hockey, but he sees the current rules concerning that element of the game as too strict.

Mangotich to fighting ejections, all in the first period. "Frank got a twogame suspension just for covering up." Inglis said.

"We got down to a few skaters and it wasn't even a good shinny game in the last period. They were awful penalties. Frank an Mike don't like to fight but they of 't back away either. They (Mimico did a smam move on us.

Besides the ejections, Milton was dogged by five minor penalties in each of the second and third periods. Milton took a 2-0 lead on Monarchs

in the first period and had a 4-2 lead in the second. Then "all hell broke loose, 'Inglis said. By the end of the second period the score was knotted at four and Monarchs slammed in four last-frame goals to Milton's

Huyge, Gauthier, Tom Fisher, Rier, Greg Collings and George Bach scored for Merchants in Mimico. Tom Robinson was a wreaking crew for Monarchs with four goals. Chris DePiero scored three times for Monarchs. Milton is off until Jan. 2.
