

# Ingoglia leads the Sounders with two goals

Adrian Ingoglia scored two goals to lead Milton Colour and Sound to a 4-2 victory over Oakville Selects in major peewee roster hockey action Saturday.

Ingoglia was brought up from house league to fill in for player shortages. Glenn McBryde and Kevin O'Donnell picked up assists on the Ingoglia goals.

Rob Crowe notched an unassisted goal for Milton while Bill Melee scored from Corey Howitt to round it out. Stewart Williams played goal for Sounders.

Jason Weeks and Keith Barnes banged in one each for Oakville.

## An impressive finish

It wasn't all peaches and cream for Milton's P.L. Robertson novice Sockets as they finished their regular season - but it was impressive enough.

Not nearly as impressive as Milton's overall numbers, however.

Sockets scored 145 goals and allowed only 36 against in Tri-County hockey action over the regular season. Milton won 20 games, tied four and lost only three. Including tournaments, Milton earned 35 wins, lost only five and tied six. Sockets had 233 goals for (5.3 per

game) and 56 against (1.5 per game).

Milton lost 1-0 to Burlington last week but posted a 7-0 shutout over Georgetown, downed Orangeville 5-1 and shut out

Chinguacousy 3-0. Milton tied league-leading Streetsville at three. In Burlington, Milton outplayed and outshot their hosts, but ran up against a hot goaltender. Milton players were up for the game, coming off a win in the east Gwillumbury tournament. Sockets outshot their hosts 23-3 but ended up on the blank end of the scoresheet.

Jeff Haydar led the way for Milton in Georgetown, with three goals and an assist. Sockets controlled the game.

Scot Bertoli fired two goals of his own while single markers to Kyle Arbuckle and Daryl Loader. Assists came from Loader, Justin Lynch, Trevor Kuhn, Doug Frehs, Stephen Seifert and Fabio Pento.

Sockets played host to Orangeville

Thursday and beat their visitors 5-1. Haydar continued to have a hot hand around the net, firing four more goals.

Arbuckle backed that with a goal on a nice passing play from linemates Lynch and Loader. Frehs picked up two assists in the game while Bertoli, Scott Tovey and Chris Griffen also earned assists.

The two top teams in the Tri-County loop faced off when Milton faced Streetsville. Streetsville has but one loss on the season, at Milton's hands. Milton and Streetsville had also previously battled to a tie.

The script stayed the same with a 3-3 tie. Frehs scored the only goal of the opening period, for Milton, from Griffen and Bertoli. The home squad retaliated with three unanswered goals in the second stanza.

Sockets came back to dominate the final frame, outshooting their foes 7-1. Griffen got Milton to within a goal, assisted by Jeff Haydar and Mark McPhail. Pento, on a lead pass from Trevor Kuhn, got the equalizer. Milton thought they had the winner later, but the referee ruled no goal due to whistle.

Ryan Smith and Kevin Wilson

shared a 3-0 shutout against Chinguacousy.

Milton directed 40 shots at a good Ching netminder.

Frehs opened the scoring for Milton from Arbuckle. The Mike Maltas, Seifert, Pento trio picked it up from there. Seifert netted two while Maltas and Pento earned double assists. Milton coaches judged it the line's finest effort of the year.

## A rare occurrence

It was one of those rare occurrences as far as Milton Hockey Moms minor novices were concerned. They actually sandwiched a loss between two wins.

It was only Milton's fourth loss of the Tri-County hockey season, weighed against 25 wins. Milton beat Burlington 4-1 last Monday and shaded Ching 1-0 Saturday but dropped a 2-1 decision to Georgetown Tuesday.

The Burlington-Milton game was close until the third period, as Milton pulled away with two goals. Hockey Moms also outshot the opposition 22-3.

Thomas Baynton led the Milton assault with two goals, the second and the insurance marker. Darren Haydar and Doug Janjevich scored the other Milton goals. Paul Meehan and Kevin Krumrei assisted on Jan-

Both Milton defensive combinations played well, as Steve Roy, Haringa, Ryan Pender and Colin Page turned in strong performances.

Springers head coach Janet Campbell said she would miss Jenny for two reasons.

"She is the 'last' of the original Springers," the coach noted. Jennifer started gymnastics at age five in 1977, the formative days of the club.

Competitive gymnastics is what it says - competitive. At times things can get a little tense. Campbell remembers "at times like that Jenny would always pull some stunt and break the tension. She could always be relied upon to make me laugh."

All the Springers will miss her wit and hard work. She even joked about retiring, "burnt out at 15." Thanks, Jenny.

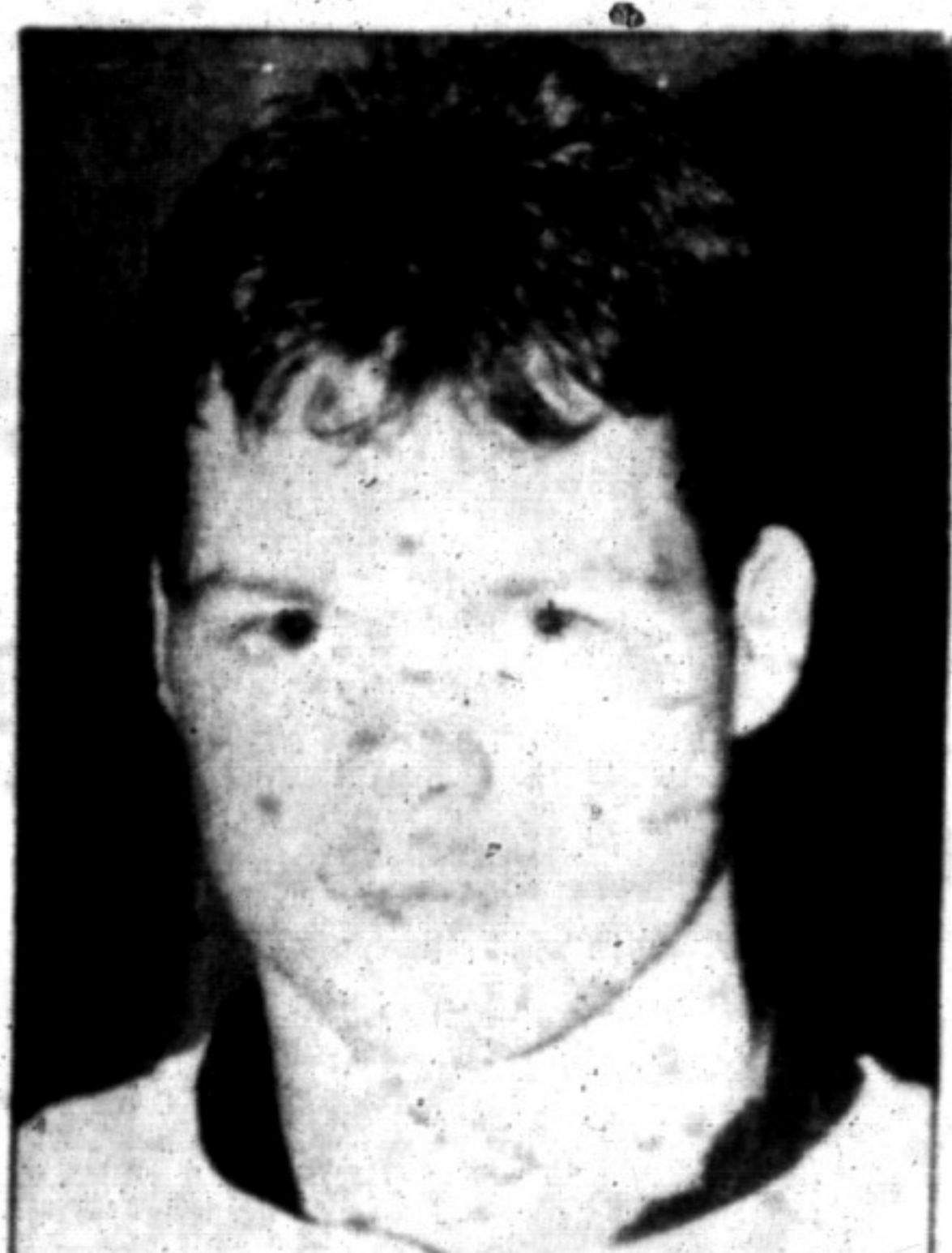
Moore, working at 177 lbs., made five pins, including one in the championship bout. In his other match, he 12-pointed (eliminate by point advantage) his opponent.

Moore defeated S. Cullis with a pin for the gold medal. Moore also pinned his first three opponents and

earned the 12-point win in his fourth bout. In his fifth, he pinned his opponent.

Moore made the trip to Collingwood with his father, Wally Moore, who trains him when Randy is not representing the highly successful Drury high school team.

Moore almost didn't make the trip to Collingwood at all, due to illness. He changed his mind just prior to the event, his father said. The younger Moore wrestled at 177 lbs., heavier than his usual competition weight of

# She knows how to take a dive

Campbellville's Bobbianne MacPherson knows how to take a dive. She knows how to do it so well that she wins competitive events doing it. That's just what she did last weekend at the John Dickinson International Invitational Diving Championship at the Etobicoke Olympium.
