#### Mustangs win curling bronze

Milton District High School's curling rink captured a bronze medal at the provincial championships beating St. Clair of Sarnia 4-1 on the weekend.

The win ended a four-year medal drought by Milton, which had last won the Ontario High School provincial curling championships in 1984.

That gold medal was won by Steve Oldford, older brother of Dave, who skipped the 1988. Mustang rink to their bronze.
"He would have liked to have

done that again," said coach Mike Sheppard of the '84 victory. The 1988 rink was skipped by Oldford with Jody Rowley playing vice. Sean Thompson threw second stone and David Rus lead.

John Peddie spared
In pool play, Milton racked up wins against Orillia, St. Clair and Arnprior before losing a 6-5 decision to Kirkland Lake. The Mustangs rebounded to beat Senator O'Connor 7-4 ending round-robin play.

Milton avenged their lone loss, with a 6-3 win over Kirkland Lake in quarter-final play.

"The fellows played a real careful game," said Sheppard.
"Just one of control all the way.
Milton's bid for gold was ended by Osgoode, High School of Met-

calfe which nipped Oldford's gang 6-5.

"Everybody missed a shot," said Sheppard.

The last-end mistakes, combined with some bad ice conditions, put Milton out of the gold medal hunt.

Osgoode went on to win the gold while Belle River District Secondary School took the silver.

The loss smarted and the Mustangs took it pretty hard. In the bronze medal game against Sarnia, the foursome tried to rattle the Mustang players by reminding them of the defeat.

There was psychological pressure from Sarnia, said Sheppard

St. Clair asked for an official to watch the bronze-medal game, but Sheppard said the move backfired. Milton played a con-

Milton entered the 18-rink bonspiel played at the Welland Curling Club with ideas of taking the gold. Sheppard said all Milton needed was a little luck and everyone curling around 70 per cent

"In total, I think we did quite well as a team and we worked well together," said Sheppard.

Oldford and Rus curled their last games for Milton as they are graduating off the team. Rowley will move up to skip and Sheppard said there should be no trouble icing a strong team for next year.
