In this position, the 25-year-old Flamboro woman is responsible for organizing leisure activities for seniors at the centre. She will work closely with the senior citizens' advisory committee, a newly-formed group composed of seniors, who will initiate many of the programs at the centre.

Mrs. McPhail is also responsible for carrying out administrative duties and will handle the centre's publicity.

Mrs. McPhail's 'past positions, listed in order starting with her most recent position, include recreation assistant with the Town of Flamboro, youth supervisor at the A.R. Kaufman WMCA in Kitchener, senior co-ordinator of the recreation centre at the Doon campus of Conestoga College in Kitchener, and recreation co-ordinator at the Sutton and District Association for the Mentally Handicapped.

She is a graduate of a two-year recreation leadership program at Conestoga College.

"They are really busy people, from what I hear. They need a place to come to during the day to be with others and be involved in activities. Instead of meeting at each other's houses, they can come here."

Mrs. McPhail said she predicts that her new position will be a rewarding one. "I'm the type of person who likes to be around other people all the time. It makes me feel good to make other people happy."


