Community Robbers get guns from Milton store

By LISA TALLYN Three Quebec residents have each peen charged with break and enter and two counts of robbery in connection with the theft of more than \$17,000 worth of property from The Halton Outdoor Shop, and two armed robberies of Credit Unions in Halton Hills.

Halton police arrested and charged the three suspects Wednesday night after they surrounded the suspect's car at the intersection of John and College streets in Georgetown moments after they fled the trust company which had just been robbed, on Main St. in that

The break-in at The Halton Outdoor Shop occurred sometime between 3 and 5 a.m. Wednesday May 11. Entrance was gained into the Main St. shop when the lock on the front door was broken.

Stolen were approximately 30 guns, several of them 22 calibre, and more than 500 rounds of ammunition, several hunting knives, a hunting cross-bow, hand-held crossbow, ammunition belts, hats and shirts

The bulk of the stolen property was recovered by police after the three arrests had been made on Wednesday. Some of the goods were found stored behind a vacant building near the intersection of Highway 25 and No. 5 Sideroad in Milton. More of the property was found in a residence on Young St. in Acton.

Only 24 of the guns have been recovered, and 200 rounds of ammunition have not been accounted for. Police are not certain if the weapons were used in the armed robbery in Georgetown.

Police say the Georgetown robbery occurred at 8 p.m. the same day as the Milton break-in. Two men armed with a sawed-off rifle and sawed-off shotgun entered the trust company and ordered everyone to lie on the floor.

The bandits cleaned out the tills, then told those in the bank to count to 60 before getting up, or they would come back and kill anyone w their head before that said an eyewitness who did not want to be identified.

Police report \$3,000 was taken in that robbery, and approximately \$4,000 was taken from the Acton Community Credit Union on Thursday May 5.

The Acton robbery was similar to the one staged in Georgetown. No one was injured in either incident.

The money from the Georgetown robbery was recovered. Police have not yet sorted out how much money from the Acton robbery will be retrieved.

Charged are two male suspects,

parolees from federal prisons in Quebec, Louis Jean Guy Longpre, 36; and Pierre Milot, 28. Also charg-

ed is Lorraine Brideau, 23, of no fixed address.

All three charged were held for a

bail hearing on Friday and are to appear in court in Milton at a later
