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### Brick Work's plans revealed

Councillor Brian Penman wants to know exactly what Canada Brick plans to build next to the Niagara Escarpment.

The brick company's former plant shut down years ago and the abandoned structure was gutted by fire. But Canada Brick plans to resurrect operations just north of Main St. on Tremaine Rd.

To that end, they are holding an open house at Our Lady of Victory school May 25 and 26 from 6-8:30 p.m. Mr. Penman asked that town staff attend.

"It's criticial we be aware of it," Mr. Penman said.

The councillor pointed out that the company is involved in "an extractive process" (clay quarry) at the foot of the Niagara Escarpment.

The provincial Progressive Conservative party may be third in seats at the Ontario legislature, but they're not taking a back seat to anyone in aggressive mail campaigns.

This week at town council the Tories supplied a critique of Sunday shopping, complete with minutes of the parliamentary debate. They also supplied a list of Liberal members and how they voted on the issue (most anyway, neither local member was included).

As well, they added a news release calling on the government to have the House sit on weekends through May so politicians will get the feel of working on Sundays.

The Tories touched a local nerve

by calling for communities to request local meetings on the matter. Muton did just that, with Mayor Gord Krantz breaking a tie vote.







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
