June 26, 1988 will live in my memory as the beginning of contemporary deterioration of human and humane values. On this date, while watching the news on TV, I viewed three parades/demonstrations: the gay parade, the AIDS demonstration/parade and, for a brief 10-15 seconds, the parade of the Korea Veterans honoring their dead comrades who sacrificed themselves in the name of democracy. Of the three the first two shared approximately four to five minutes exposure while the vets received very little comparatively speaking.

The AIDS demonstration/parade, however, blew my mind. There are innocent victims to this dread disease, but according to statistics the greater percentage of people who suffer from this frightening illness acquired the infection from rather detrimental contact with a carrier of said disease. Remember their deaths, if you will, but please, do not ask the public to be a part of the scheme to erect a monument to these said deaths.

Quite some time ago quite a number of men gave their lives so that democracy, as we Canadians know it, would not perish. Many were wounded as well, and yet these many brave men have nothing that is representative of the deeds they performed. Not only was no memorial monument erected, but there was no medal struck by the government to immortalize the war that was fought in Korea from 1950-1953. As a matter of fact it was only after years and years of uncompromising urgent lobbying by the Korea Veterans Association (Canada) that the Canadian government finally agreed to rename the Korean Conflict the Korean War.

When you parade or watch a parade, make it for something worthwhile; when you want to erect a monument, do it for a cause that deserves the recognition. When you

cover a story, regardless of the media branch, cover one that reflects the worthwhile history of this great country of ours. Maybe you won't sell as many newspapers, (because that's what it's all about, isn't it), but the general public will be more aware of our useful history instead of the sensationalism that seems to be prevalent in our media today.

Don't expand brick plant

The following letter to the Niagara Escarpment Commission was filed with The Champion for publication.

To whom it may concern:

We the residents of Milton Heights do object to the proposed location and future expansion of the brick plant on Steeles Avenue and Tremaine Road by Canada Brick. We also feel the following questions must be addressed before any further official approvals are arbitrarily given.

1. We want the plant located on the site the RDB proposal earlier approved.
2. Numerous residents have purchased homes based on previously approved site locations.
3. We contend that the location of this proposed plant will have a negative impact on our property values throughout Milton Heights.
4. What guarantees are there that the existing environment will not be negatively impacted, eg: air, noise, water, visual, ground vibrations?
5. Will blasting be necessary in the operation of extraction of raw materials?
6. Will future expansion be "rubber stamped" once the building is approved?
7. What long term aspects have been addressed regarding environmental impact?

8. Were permits already issued to change the location from the original proposal?

9. Why has no documentation and handouts been sent to all people concerned to show what Canada Brick are proposing?

10. What beautifications are proposed for the west side of Townline Road as presently it is an abomination?

11. What guarantees do we have that the extraction and conveyor will not run at night?

12. We are concerned that this operation will have a negative impact on water tables in the immediate area.

13. Will the natural water running into the Sixteen Mile Creek and area ponds be affected by the proposed new excavation?

Unit these questions have been answered and until a full environmental impact study has been presented to the residents of Milton Heights we feel no further approvals

should be given to Canada Brick for development or expansion of their existing operations on Townline Road.

5. Previous winners cannot compete in the Milton Fair Queen contest. Contestants may appear only once in a Miss C.N.E. Contest.
6. The winner of the Miss Milton Fair Queen title must not enter a second similar provincial or national contest between the date of May 1 and Labour Day of the current year.
7. The Fair Queen must attend all necessary events representing Milton Fair for one year including the District 5 Zone meeting of the Ontario Association of Agricultural Societies in October, the Ontario Association of Agricultural Societies Convention in February, the C.N.E. Queen of the Fairs Contest in August.
