supply money for the land to house new facilities in other communities.

She replied "no" in both cases. But the province is approving similar applications elsewhere, she pointed out.

Mr. Penman asked if the newer direction in facilities was caused by the new (Liberal) provincial government.

The trend toward smaller, what are considered perhaps more comfortable, seniors' homes has been going on for a decade, she said.

"I think it's politics," councillor Bill Johnson said.

"I don't think it was, I know it was, to a large degree," added Milton mayor Gord Krantz.

Ms Ewart told councillors plans

called for smaller institutions combined in a multi-use environment with senior citizens' apartments, perhaps group homes and foster homes. Such a complex could provide a base for various social services operations or allow a focal point for the agencies to deliver their services, she added.

If a smaller Milton complex is built, the price for renovations, needed in any case according to the region, drops from \$18 million to \$12 million. The region's share is approximately half.

Two smaller new complexes are expected to cost \$5.7 million, exclusive of land costs. With current regional allocations at \$8.6 million, that means an additional \$3.2 million is required, plus the land purchase price.

Mr. Krantz said Halton could count on at least \$5 million when the land price is added.

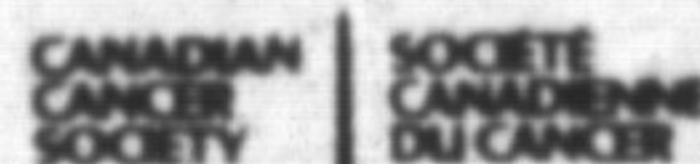
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
