Milton Mustangs waltz into playoffs

One Milton District High School football team was tuning up for the playoffs, while the other was fighting for its life in high school football action last week

The junior Mustangs used their final regular season game against E.C. Drury to tune up for their playoff game against Blakelock, where they travel next Wednesday. Milton won the game 30-0.

"The defence played very well," said defensive coach Doug Foley. "We only allowed Drury one sustained offensive drive all game.

Foley picked out Alex Pyle, Rob Brown and Lorenzo Zanatta as having their best games of the season.

For the offence, the game was used to get some of their backups a little playing time. It was also used to find a replacement for injured running back Bill King

"Zanatta and Brown were both very impressive at the fullback position," said coach Don Hipple

More importantly than winning the game, the Mustangs left the battle unscathed and are in good health for their playoff game against the bigger and stronger Tabbies. In their regular season meeting this year, Blakelock won 9-7 on a late field goal.

"The game is going to come down to which team can execute their offence the best. because both defences are equal. We're going to have to play our best football to beat them. predicted Hipple.

On the senior side, the Mustangs lost a crucial 14-7 decision to Blakelock in a game which décided the fourth and final playoff spot in senior Tier II action.

"Our defence started very strong," said coach Keith Pearce, who was forced to watch the game from the stands thanks to a one-game suspension. "We sacked their quarterback three times in a row to start the game."

Blakelock scored their first touchdown when they recovered a Milton fumble in the Milton end zone. Milton blocked their attempted extrapoint though.

Milton scored a punt single to take the score

to the locker room at 6-1.

"At this point it was still anybody's game," said Pearce.

A Blakelock interception deep in the Milton zone gave Blakelock excellent field position where they punched the ball in to move the score to 14-1 .

A late touchdown pass from Jodie Rowley to Ben Swarbrick made the final score 14-7. The loss left the Mustangs with a 2-4 record for the season.

"We accomplished our goal of being competitive this season, but next year our goal will be to turn the close losses into wins and make the playoffs," said Pearce.
