The long-time resident of Nassagaweya handily finished first in a three-horse race for the two seats available in the ward. It was one of only a few races after both incumbents. Wray Lamont and Don McMillan, opted against running

For Mr. Lee, the size of his victory was impressive by any standards. In only his first real election, he captured 900 votes, more than the other two candidates combined

The real battle was for the second seat with eight-year transplanted Oakville councillor Bruce Attenborough nudging Paul Rumford by a count of 488-391

Mr. Lee attributed his massive victory to old-fashioned campaigning and is long-time residence in

borough. "He worked hard and he deserved to come first

"I'm doing it (serving on council for selfish reasons - I enjoy it.

Mr. Attenborough moved to Nassagaweya two years ago because. "I think Oakville is out of control I want some breathing room. I'm tired of 5,000 sq.ft. homes on 60-foot lots

He said he's tried to familiarize himself with the local issues, "as

Mr. Deoni walked away with the trustee's position in Wards 1 and 3. Algis Rimkus made a weak showing with only 28 votes compared to Mr. Deoni's 170.

"I feel great," said Mr. Deoni after he learned of his victory. "It seems like I knocked on every door in the two wards. If I didn't talk to people at the door I sent letters."

He says he actively campaigned for the past four weeks.
