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## Fringe party candidates want more morality, less government

Neither of them have any more chance of winning the Oakville-Milton federal seat than Santa Claus does, but Jim Stock and Paul Calloway are giving it the old college

try anyway.

Both appear to be sombre, serious men, committed to their ideals. Mr. Stock is spokesman for the Libertarians while Mr. Calloway represents the Christian Heritage Party.

They are undoubtedly viewed largely as curiosities by the bulk of the electorate, bookends surrounding the more conventional can-

didates.

Progressive Conservative Otto Jelinek, Liberal Bonnie Brown and New Democratic Party candidate Richard Banigan rail and thunder at one another. But Mr. Stock and Mr. Calloway largely spend their time explaining who they are and the bare bones of their philosophies.

Mr. Calloway's position is if anything the lonelier of the two. He focusses mostly on moral issues and how morality must play a bigger role in government.

Mr. Stock believes government as a whole should play a smaller part in everything.

Mr. Stock favours a kind of laissez-faire capitalism which would be starkly unadorned, almost ignored, by the government. He proposes a 20 per cent across the board tax rate. He would sell all Crown corporations immediately to the private sector and plow the proceeds into lowering the deficit.

"Libertarians stand for less government, and less taxes," Mr. Stock told the audience at a Milton DECISION'88

The party would abolish censorship They are pro-choice on abortion. They favour free trade and bitterly rebuke its detractors, much to the delight of the Progressive Conservatives.

Mr. Stock said Thursday the sale of Crown corporations would raise \$100 billion to apply against the principle of the nation's \$320 billion debt.

He said "the fear-mongering tactics the Liberals use are really disgusting" concerning free trade. Thursday he slammed Liberal and New Democratic Party criticism of the deal. "If you believe all that you'll believe anything. Are we so

afraid, do we feel so inferior, that we

can't compete with them (Americans)?"

Mr. Calloway's party also supports the free trade deal. They are against the Meech Lake Accord because it "creates a privileged elite" and for capital punishment "when a judge and jury are unanimous."

The party wants stricter controls on immigration so as not to promote enclaves of immigrants in one area.

They strongly oppose abortion. Mr. Jelinek and Mrs. Brown are also against abortion, although they each draw the line between their positions and party policy. Mr. Banigan is a pro-choice advocate.

According to Mr. Calloway, if a pro-choice policy is offered a woman, 'what you are doing is taking away her responsibility' for her actions.

The candidate is quick to caution that Christian Heritage Party members "are not fanatics or rednecks: We are not Bible-pounders. We believe in laws based on morality, not morality based on laws."

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
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
