MPP Elliot named chairman of provincial dump committee

Halton North MPP Walt Elliot has been elected chairman of a provincial committee charged with responsibility for one of the most explosive political challenges facing Ontario. in the late 1980s; how to deal with the province's mountain of garbage.

All across Ontario, municipalities are searching for new landfill sites and stumbling through the long and laborious procedure of getting them approved. In Halton, the search has been going on for 10 years and has cost taxpayers approximately \$7"

Regional municipalities surrounding Toronto look warily on that city, which is now feeling the crunch as available dump space dwindles. Metro Toronto will need new landfill sites by the early 1990s:

Halton's neighbour to the east, Peel, is also searching for new landfills. Sites under consideration include two along the Halton border, near rural Milton.

The waste management commit-

tee is to develop a co-ordinated approach to the problem to present to the full Liberal caucus.

Mr. Elliot said the government 'has identified recycling as a large component of its waste management strategy." Recycling will be considered together with an ongoing review of the environmental assessment procedure, the government dump-approval process.

Halton politicians have roundly criticized the approval procedure as unwieldy and given the impression they feel provincial bureaucrats and politicians more or less make up the

rules as they go along. Mr. Elliot said other initiatives being considered include promoting reusable or biodegradable packag-

Mr. Elliot is also chairman of the standing committee on general government, and will preside over examinations of budgets for several ministries, including environment, tourism and recreation, labour, and municipal affairs.
