Damage Set at \$12,000 Owner says raccoons are to blame for fire

Ten chickens perished in a fire in a small barn on Appleby Line, near the rear entrance of Kelso Conservation Area, Friday morning.

Firefighters rescued two chickens and five pigs from the blaze shortly after 10 a.m. Two pigs were badly burned, but are recovering nicely.

Shaun Stepto, owner of the barn and livestock, says he arrived home from his job at Southam Murray Printing in Toronto at 7:30 a.m. He went to bed and was awakened by rapping on his door.

A neighbour had spotted the fire in the barn. Mr. Stepto called the Fire Department on 911 emergency line.

Mr. Stepto says he experienced a problem with the line. He could barely hear the person on the other end.

The interior of the building was gutted. Mr. Stepto says he will have to rebuild. He estimates damage at \$12,000.

Milton Fire Department says the blaze was caused by stray sparks from a grinder

in the shed. Mr. Stepto disagrees. He says he didn't grind anything in the barn when he returned from work.

He says the blaze could have been caused by raccoons chewing the wiring. He has had a problem with the animals in the past Until he can rebuild, Mr. Stepto's animals are staying at a neighbour's barn

level for the abolition of private ambulance companies to be replaced by a provincially run service.

Dennis Munch, owner of the service, is "pleased and relieved" the strike is over.

We (management) were optimistic the deal would be ratified," said Mr. Munch.

Outside workers from neighbouring ambulance companies have pitched in during the strike. Only five of the service's ten ambulances were on the road.

Mr. Munch admits many problems arose over the past five mon-

"Response times have definitely

suffered. Transfers were negligible. and some code three calls had to be deferred."

Mr. Armes says the problems were serious.

"There were major problems. Twenty-minute response times are unheard of. There were cases of treatment in taxis and transfers to hospital in fire and police vehicles."

Service should increase dramatically on Jan, 23 but Mr. Munch says he may still be shortstaffed. Mr. Armes says that approximately 20 of the 85 officers who were with the company in August have since found other employment.

"We don't expect a full complement until May," said Mr. Armes.
