In the senior division, Drury was held to one medal, a silver by John Madden at 134 lbs. Madden put in perhaps his best effort in a major event in reaching the final.

Rowbottom, who revenged a GHAC loss last year by defeating Bishop Ryan's Cory Curran.

On Thursday, Drury hosted the North Halton Tri-Meet. Drury led the meet in wins as they went 26-13 on the day (12-7 in exhibitions, 14-6 in team competitions). Georgetown led in overall win percentage, though, as they entered a small but strong team.

Bishop Reding trailed the two more established squads but put forth a spirited effort against their more-experienced rivals.

· The Spartans were led by Paul Carles at 3-0 while Nick Thompson, Liat Tan and Kirk Rowbottom earned two wins each.

The top Reding wrestler was Ted Vankestrom who had a pair of wins and only narrowly lost to Rowbottom.

Tomorrow's third annual E.C. Drury Invitational wrestling meet is looking like it will be the biggest ever with more than 200 wrestlers expected. All Halton schools, Bishop Ryan and To Westdale of Hamilton and several teams from outside of GHAC will be in attendance.

Drury is the defending champs, but if Bishop \ge Ryan brings their full squad, as they have said they will, Drury coach Larry Jaraslowski thinks they will be the team to beat.

# Wood takes provincial car rally title

Perhaps the most famous of all car rallies is the Paris to Dakar road race, currently being run in North Africa and Europe. If Milton's Ross Wood has his way, one day he'll be the man to beat in that famous race.

Wood has taken the first steps on his way to the major events by placing first overall in the five-race Ontario Car Rally Production Class along with driver Andy Browning of

Wood and Browning were

honoured at the 1988 Ontario Car Rally Championship Awards presentation held over the weekend.

The team managed three firstplace finishes in the series of performance rallies with their raceprepared Toyota Corolla GTS. The

first win came in Minden in June. That was followed by a victory in Britt (on Georgian Bay) in August and North Bay in September. The twosome finished second in Peterborough in November, which clinched the overall title.

In a performance or stage rally the object is to travel over a closed course on narrow, twisty forest roads as fast as possible. The Ministry of Natural Resources roads are closed to the public while the competition is in progress. Cars are set off at one-minute intervals and race against the clock. These rallies ... are run under all manner of weather and road conditions.

Browning, 22, the driver, began rallying as soon as he got a driver's licence at age 16. A graduate of electronics from Sheridan College, Browning now works in the research division of Ontario Hydro.

Wood is very impressed with Browning's driving.

"Andy is a former student of mine ar Bramalea," said Wood, a guidance counsellor at Bramalea Secondary School. "He started racing as soon as he could and in 1986 won the Canadian Novice Championship. He's got tremendous potential.

In rally car racing, the driver, in this case Browning, must drive the car over unfamiliar courses as fast as he can without losing control. The co-driver's job is to give the driver detailed information regarding the layout of the course and how far ahead or behind the competition they are. That way the driver can

adjust his speed accordingly. The faster the car goes, the more dangerous it is for the driver, said Wood. If Wood and Browning are well ahead of their competition. Wood passes on that information. allowing Browning to slow down a little and make sure the two cross

the finish line. "Andy started to get discouraged when he totalled four cars in a short period of time earlier in his career." said Wood, who has been rallying for more than 20 years. "He was always the fastest driver, but his co-drivers didn't tell him when he could take it easy and try and save the car while

staying in first place." This is where Wood and his many years of experience come in. He is able to keep track of the route, as well as knowing where they are in

the overall standings. The race car is specially prepared with protective plates on the bottom of the car and competition suspension parts to take all the abuse associated with type of racing. However, in the Production Class, no engine modifications are permitted. Fires are used up at an alarming rate, but fortunately the team is sponsored by General Tire Motorsports.

"Now that we have the credentials of winning the overall title, we're out looking for additional sponsors in order to tackle the Canadian championships," explained Wood. "In addition to trying to win the Ontario title again this year, we are going to go to some rallies in Quebec and New Brunswick."

Wood said the logical progression in rally car driving is to progress to the national level, then on to the international level. We may be seeing Wood and Browning in the Paris to Dakar Rally yet.
