cerned about how long it would take to deliver the conduit. Mr. Melanson said delays mean Milton will lose young families to other centres.

"A lot of children living in this town today will have to go to Cobourg or St. Catharines to get a starter home."

Mr. Melanson supports new residential growth to bolster Milton business too, but Mr. Day countered that new growth may mean "more customers, but also more competition. I don't see it as a major benefit to the chamber of commerce."

Regional officials said that if stage three well work goes ahead, it becomes questionable whether Halton will be able to financially support its share of the big pipe later. The stage three well work involves upgrading a sewer plant as well as drilling new wells, and is expected to cost at least \$11 million. Stage one and two cost estimates run to only \$2 million.

A pipeline could cost as much as: \$100 million.
