Lone gunman wanted by cops

Halton Regional Police and Crime Stoppers are looking for the gunman who robbed the manager of the Bonanza Restaurant on Plains Rd. in Burlington last May.

At 11:50 p.m. on Monday May 23, 1988, a lone suspect armed with a small handgun entered the restaurant by a rear door and held up the manager in the office.

The suspect ordered the manager to put cash into a green sports bag.

The gunman then pulled the phone cord from the wall and fled the building the same way he entered, by the rear door.

The suspect is described as male, white, 25 to 30 years old, medium build, 5'10", weighing 180 pounds. He had shoulder length brown hair and was wearing light coloured blue jeans and jean jacket, and multi-coloured T-shirt.

Crime Stoppers will pay up to \$1,000 for information that leads to an arrest in this case or any other case. Callers are not required to reveal their identities or testify in court. The Crime Stopper's toll free number is 1-800-668-5151.

Best and Krantz trade barbs in council over town's future

An exchange between councillor Colin Best and mayor Gord Krantz was couched in courteous diplomatic language Monday night but an undercurrent of tension ran through the dialogue.

Mr. Best said Milton was drifting, a pawn to planners and politicians at higher levels of government.

Mr. Best, the man who won more votes in the November municipal election than any other councillor, is often rumored to be a potential candidate for the mayor's chair.

During the new business portion of Monday's council meeting Mr. Best asked whether Halton regional chairman Peter Pomeroy had yet been invited to address Milton council about remarks he made to the Milton Chamber of Commerce two weeks ago.

Mr. Pomeroy's speech was interpreted as highly controversial by local municipal politicians. He indicated Milton may yet be saddled with a landfill site no matter what happens in the legal battle over its placement, and he said the town should be prepared to grow to 300,000 people if a water main is constructed from Lake Ontario.

Mr. Krantz offered a general response to Mr. Best's query, saying Mr. Pomeroy was "more than welcome to come up anytime."

"It seems to me we're losing control of this town," Mr. Best said, referring to a weekend Toronto newspaper report indicating chairmen of all Ontario's regional governments had put forward potential dumpsite locations in their jurisdictions "for common use."

Council needs "to get some direction from the regional chairman," Mr. Best said. Looking at Mr. Krantz, he added, "what action are you taking?"

"I'm not going to react or over-react to any newspaper article," Mr. Krantz replied. "They have never run this town and they never will."

Pressing, Mr. Best asked, "what actions you as the mayor are taking? Consultants and regional planners are taking control. We seem to be losing control of the agenda."

"I don't think we are losing control," Mr. Krantz replied. "It's exactly on track." He added that it was not his intention "to shadow-box with the media."

"This council looks to you for leadership on this, both at the region and at Queen's Park," Mr. Best said.

"I can assure you you'll get all the leadership you want," Mr. Krantz replied.

Earlier in the discussion Mr. Krantz had suggested Mr. Best propose a motion, which would mean a vote among councillors, to decide if Mr. Pomeroy should be asked to appear at Milton council.

As the debate between the mayor and Mr. Best evolved, however, Mr. Krantz tossed that idea aside. Closing off the discussion, Mr. Krantz turned to Milton administrator Roy Main and directed him to "make sure Mr. Pomeroy comes up here as soon as possible."

Perhaps to Mr. Best, perhaps to council at large, but obviously as a warning, Mr. Krantz added, "come with your guns loaded."
