## Jewellery heist clues needed

More than \$10,000 in jewellery stolen in the early hours of the morning recently is the subject of a continued investigation by members of the Halton Regional Police.

After responding to an alarm at approximately 4:30 a.m., Tuesday Jan. 10, 1989, police discovered that the glass entrance door to Consumers Distributing on Steeles Ave. in Milton had been smashed.

Culprits then forced entry into a number of display cases, removing a variety of jewellery. Necklaces, earnings and pendants valued at more than \$10,000 were stolen.

Identification officers were successful at gathering identifiable

evidence from the scene.







