

Disabled man needs ride

Councillors are reluctant to say what the answer may be, but municipal clerk Bill Roberts appears to be working on solving a disabled rural man's problem.

Dr. Robert Halet was using the regional disabled commuter system, Pegasus, for transportation to and from Milton District Hospital. However, the Pegasus system is only to be used by disabled people travelling from one regional municipality to another.

Soon Dr. Halet will no longer have access to Pegasus. A letter from his son-in-law, Walter Sopinka, was read at council Monday night. In essence, it asks what can be done.

Steve Lollar, assistant to town administrator Roy Main, provided several light moments at Monday's council meeting as he unveiled a video made during the recent "Local Government Week in Ontario," an effort by the province to heighten awareness on the subject.

Mr. Lollar's tape featured some mock council meetings orchestrated in Milton's town hall by elementary and high school students. Councillors pitched in to help out.

In one scene Mayor Gord Krantz ceremoniously removes his heavy gold chain of office and slowly

drapes it over the shoulders of a fifth-grader chosen to play mayor. Finished, the mayor steps back. The youngster beams and then flings both fists high in the air like a triumphant boxer.

In another, councillor Barry Lee deadpans through a presentation to tenth-grade Bishop Reding students, who are faced with making a decision on his dilemma.

Drawing on a current controversy, Mr. Lee tells the students if a quarry atop the Niagara escarpment is expanded his house will fall into the pit. Already, he's unemployed due to mental strain brought on by constant noise in the quarry, blasting has drained his well and he can't even use the out-house because it's overgrown with trees the Niagara Escarpment Commission won't let him cut down.

"The only good part is my mother-in-law doesn't visit anymore," councillor Lee tells the pupils.

There is no record of council's decision.

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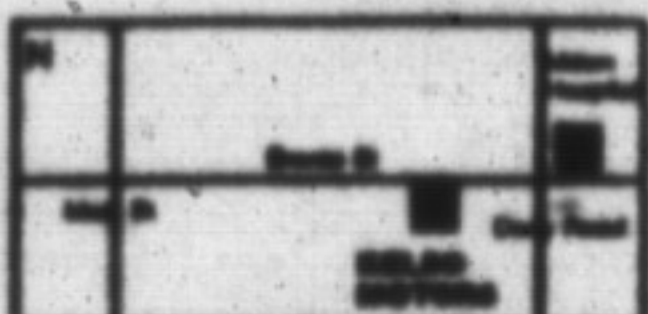
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Coulson-Stover wed at St. Paul's
