Councillor Bill Johnson was also quick to oppose Mr. Clements' suggestion. Such inert construction materials could instead be used for road beds, Mr. Johnson said. As well, there is still some question as to what is an inert material, he added.

Ontario Hydro is "desperately searching for ways" to get rid of ashes from power plant burning, Mr. Johnson noted. While "some consider" those ashes inert, there is still suspicion they contain toxic heavy metals, he said.

Town planner Bob Zsadanyi said current quarry rehabilitation standards imposed by the province are "wide open," and that he too is aware of a case in which a "very large" Toronto-based corporation hoped to fill quarries with ashes.

Mr. Johnson said quarrying companies consistently attempt to alter initial rehabilitation plans, which often depict natural settings, so the craters can instead be filled with garbage. He indicated that Mr. Clements' suggestion would just encourage them.

"Let's not make it any worse. Let's make sure it does not get any worse."

Councillor Clements' amendment was defeated. The resolution in favor of no landfilling on the escarpment goes to full council for formal approval Monday.


