Diver wins provincial age group gold

A former Campbellville resident, now boarding in Thunder Bay, has qualified for the Ontario diving team which will take part in the Canadian Rummer Cames in August in Saskatoon.

Bobbiann MacPherson, who until September trained at the Etobicoke Olympium, finished third overall in the open division at the Canada Cames Trials as well as winning the provincial championship in her age

at the provincials held recently in Thunder Bay, MacPherson took first place in the seven-metre tower and three- metre springboard and second stably the one-metre springboard.

Thanks to the combined results, the 15-year-old was named the outstanding diver in her age group.

The competition was a little tougher to qualify for the Summer Cames, held once every four years.

The games are open to all divers under the age of 21, who aren't currently on the national team. In other words, it's a fairly wide-open com-

The top three divers qualified for the Ontario team. The score was comprised of two of the best three Competing in the 14-15 age group scores from the three events, the 10m tower and three and one metre springboard.

Kelly Vrooman took a pair of firsts, thereby qualifying easily. Laurie Nelson ended up with two second-place

finishes, which meant MacPherson's second on the 10m tower and third on the three-metre springboard was just good enough to squeak her onto

"Bobbiann had to beat out a couple of girls who were on the provincial team last year," said her mother. Marianne Cormack

According to Cormack, Mac-Pherson has made great strides since she headed north and hooked up with new coach Mitch Geller.

"She's made great strides with Mitch," said Cormack. "Right now she's a tower specialist but he thinks springboard as well."

As far as short-term goals go, Mac-Pherson is hoping to do well at the

Canadian Summer Games, said Cormack. Also coming up are the senior summer national championships in Calgary in July and the age group nationals in July.

"If Bobbiann does well at the age group nationals, she could qualify for the age group world team. It's a long shot but she could do it. She would then be one of the top three divers in Canada in the 14-15 age group," said Cormack.

If she does make the team, the age group World Championships are being held in Spain in August.

In the longer term, the Olympics she'll eventually be very good on the are on the horizon, either in Barcelona in 1992, or in 1996.
