
Single-handed sculptures

Refurbished Rotary Park pool will keep you cool this summer

The Rotary Park pool which has been in operation since 1963 is getting a facelift this year before it opens for business on Saturday, June 24th.

Regulars and new users will be delighted with the colour sealed (green) asphalt deck. No more burning hot, black asphalt. The pool, wading pool and building - inside and out - have been given a fresh coat of paint. Brown quarry tiles now cover the cement floors of the change-rooms and new washroom cubicles and toilets have been installed.

Last year's sizzling summer heat broke all attendance records with close to 10,000 people enjoying a dip in the pool. At any one time, the 100' X 60' pool can hold 300 people. The highly qualified and extensively trained lifeguards are ready for another busy summer.


The pool is open daily to the public in the afternoon and evenings with family swimming times on weekends. Toddlers can splash in the wading pool at no charge. Adults may also want to take advantage of the weekday noon-hour swim.

Students and adults pay \$1.50, children (12 years and under) pay \$1 while the family rate is \$4. Summer passes of \$20 for adults and students and \$18 for children may be purchased at the Leisure Services Department.

Concerts in the park


Milton Arts Productions and the Leisure Services Dept. are once again sponsoring free Sunday afternoon concerts.
