

# Squirts win second tournament title

For the second time this year, the Milton Lions girls squirt softball team has walked away from a tournament with the championship title.

This time it was the Mississauga Valley Tournament, and the girls certainly left no room for doubt as they whitewashed Chingaucousy 13-0 in the finals.

Jayne Currie dominated the game from the mound as she struck out 11 batters in five innings and gave up only one hit, thanks to solid defence.

Milton got only six hits but Ching's defence let them down as Milton ran wild on the basepaths.

Erin Young led the way with the bat, as she hammered a triple, double and single while leadoff hitter Julie Arone reached first on a bunt and had another single. Jaime Nichols also chipped in with a hit.

Milton's first game of the tournament was against the defending champs, Clarkson. This year Clarkson were finalists in the Milton tournament and had won their own tournament, so they were favoured.

Milton, though, didn't agree, and whipped Clarkson 14-3 in five innings. Currie struck out nine hitters and allowed only five hits in five innings pitched.

Milton's bats were hot as they amassed 14

hits in four innings. Corinn Jeffrey, Corina Munroe and Alicia Gunn each smacked a double and single, Currie tripled and singled while Nichols, Young, Arone and Tara Cook each added singles.

Milton started off a little nonchalant in their second game against Brampton. Brampton's first hit of the game was a grand-slam homerun in the first inning. Those were Brampton's only four runs of the game, though, as Milton went on to win 13-4.

The Lions' semifinal game was against Cedar Hill of Scarborough. Although Milton out-hit Cedar Hill 17-3, they only managed to win the game 20-13.

In the Brampton and Cedar Hill games, Jeffrey and Currie shared the pitching as they fanned 25 batters over 11 innings. The 32 hits were spread around all the batters.

Jeffrey homered twice and added a triple, double and two singles. Gunn homered and hit a pair of doubles, Currie homered, tripled and added a pair of safeties, Stephanie Taylor tripled and singled, Crystal Finley had two singles, Cook doubled and added two singles, Munroe had a two-bagger and a single while Young had four safeties, Nichols three and Arone two.

The MVPs in the four games were Currie, Gunn, Jeffrey and Young.
