There were 103,160 calls for service after traffic accidents in 1988. Also, there were 12,706 false alarms. Fatal. accidents are up from 14 in 1987 to 22 in 1988, though accidents involving injuries are down. There has been no real change in the number of traffic injuries although the population has grown

The RIDE program stopped 48,662 vehicles in 1988, an increase of almost 7,000 over the previous year. Warnings decreased from 4,476 to 3,256 and arrests decreased from 162 to 10%. At the same time, charges for impaired driving increased by 10 to 101.
