Pinned by a forklift, man dies in accident

Kenneth Brooks, 45, of Acton died in an industrial accident in Milton

Mr. Brooks, an employee of Halton Lift Truck, was on a service call at SKD Company in Milton when the forklift he was servicing fell and pinned him beneath it.

The accident occured at 1:30 p.m. on Wednesday, August 9. According to police, workers at the plant noticed Mr. Brooks was pinned and attempted a rescue before calling for help.

Mr. Brooks was pronounced dead at the scene. Milton coroner Dr. Ivan Hunter said results of the autopsy, which was done at Milton District Hospital, show crushing injuries.

"The whole plant is shook up about it," said Linda Berry of SKD. "Nothing like this has ever happened here. This is the first and hopefully last time."

SKD does automotive metal stamping and employs about 100 people.

Ms. Berry said the plant has no unusal incidence of accidents. The company refused to comment further pending an inquest which

has been called by the Ontario Ministry of Labour. The date for that inquest has not yet been set.
