If Milton qualifies for the maximum amount of provincial funding, Queen's Park will contribute \$1,540,000 to the enterprise. Mr. Arbic described the town's chances as "good" for sizeable grants, especially since municipal staff have been "working with the Ministry all the way through" project planning.

The pool is now expected to cost \$5.4 million and the gym-fitness area \$3 million.

A substantial portion of the revenue for construction will come in the form of corporate and private donations. Municipal plans call for \$1.5 million through fundraising activities.

The town plans on generating \$2.5 million from levies against developers and ratepayers. New development, primarily industrial, is slated to contribute \$2 million while tax levies will add another \$500,000. Milton plans on issuing \$1,560,000 in new debt, as long-term debentures, to further defray costs.

Milton's capacity to issue new debt is good, according to town treasurer Jim McQueen. Even with the new debentures the town would be only at one-quarter of its maximum approved borrowing capacity. The new debt would boost local property taxes two per cent in 1991 and less than half a per cent in 1992, Mr. Arbic said.

Milton will also spend \$1.3 million from various reserve funds on the project. That funding is not expected to put municipal reserve levels at risk, according to Mr. Arbic's report.

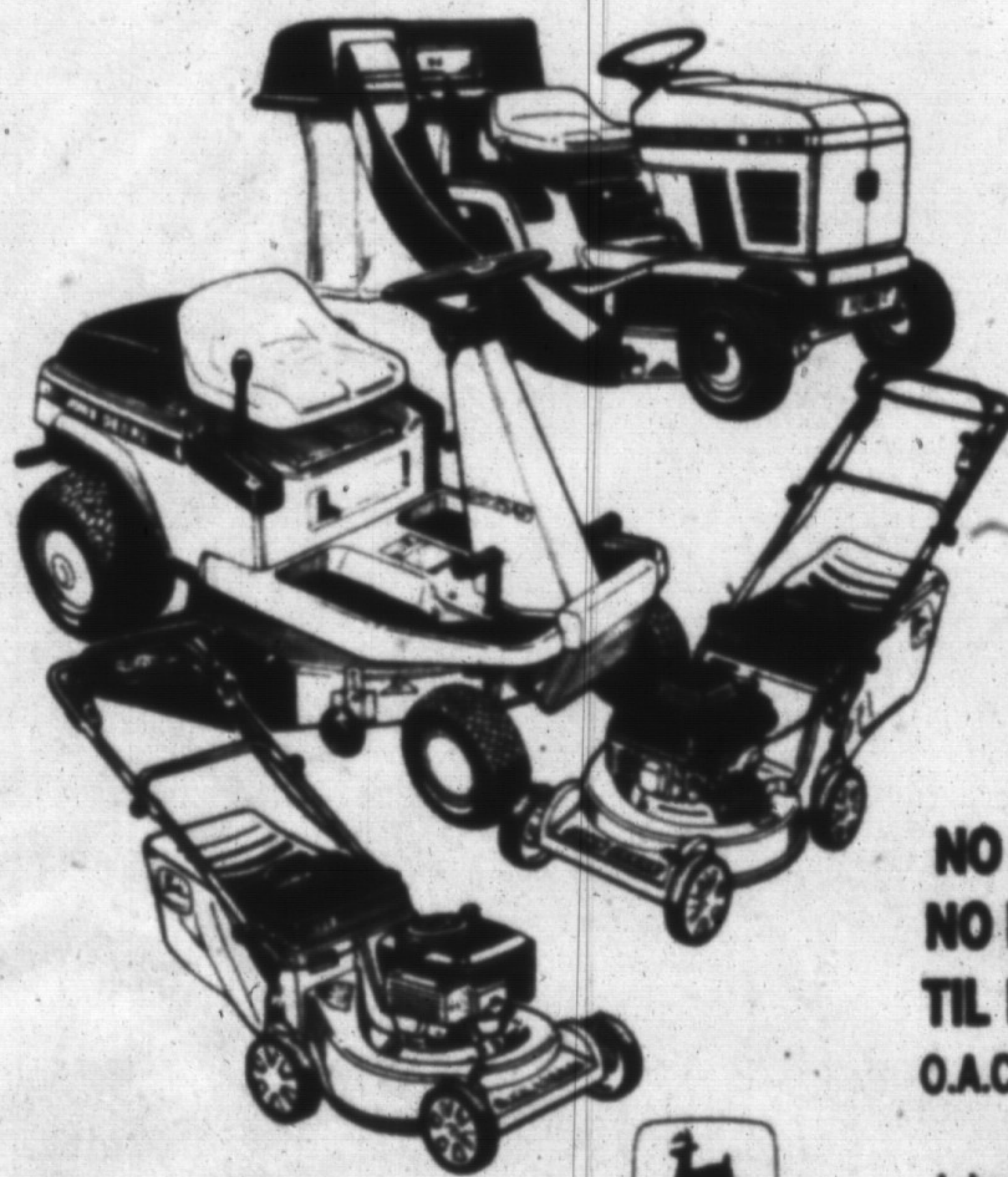
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
