## Grant gives more independence to handicapped residents

People with developmental disabilities will benefit from more than \$ \$300,000 in funding recently granted to a local non-profit organization by the provincial government.

The North Halton Association for the Developmentally Handicapped ≥ (NHADH) has received \$328,042 from the Ministry of Community dand Social Services.

The funding will be used to ex-5 pand the organization's residential and day programs, according to John Ellis, NHADH executive director.

"We're very excited about the Ofunding the ministry has provided," Ssaid Mr. Effis. 'The money will help us meet our objectives.

About \$77,000 of the grant will accommodate NHADH's day programs in Milton, upgrade its Georgetown residential program as well as pay for additional furnishings.

Annual funding of \$251,042 will increase staff and cover operating costs associated with expansion of the programs.

The upgrading will include renovations to make the organization's Georgetown residence completely wheelchair accessible, accommodate new residents with multiple disabilities and enable NHADH to serve more people.

The new residents are expected to move from a nursing home to the Georgetown facility sometime this fall. . Walt Elliot, Halton North MPP, announced the funding last week on behalf of Charles Beer, Ontario minister of Community and Social Services.

The funding was granted in conjunction with the ministry's multi-

year plan for community living geared to provide services and support for people with developmental disabilities.

The plan is to ensure services and support are in place at the community level to help the developmentally handicapped live independently.
