"I was always awed by (Gordie) Howe when he would come on the ice. He was a legend, and acted like it. When he got a penalty he would go to the box without a word."


"Is Gretzky the best player I ever saw? That's hard to say, because he isn't as spectacular as many of his predecessors: As far as having a feel for the game, there has been no one better. There have been better skaters, better shooters, and better stickhandlers, but none of them have put it all together like Gretzky has. He does it all, both on and off the ice, and has been a great asset to the sport of hockey."

These words from my book, Calling The Shots; sum up my feelings about two fine athletes, Gordie Howe and Wayne Gretzky, and I'm sure those feelings are shared by most of you.

Not just the all-time scoring mark Howe established in his 26 years in the NHL and Gretzky eclipsed in just 11, but also their qualities as human beings, both on and off the ice, were shown to all.

Big Gordie came from a small town in Saskatchewan and I remember reading how excited he was when Jack Adams, then general manager of the Detroit Red Wings, gave him a jacket with I'm not sure of the total impact Howe had on the Red Wing emblem on it when he first joined the club. He was a very humble lad then and remains so to this day.

As for "The Kid" as Gordie calls him, Wayne is from a similar mold and has proven his ability violent acts, but check him a little too hard and also goes far beyond the game of hockey. Wouldn't it be something to see him in action as a quarterback in football, sinking baskets in the

If you compare his accomplishments to standhead and shoulders above all others, as would

Howe. They say that Howe used to go and work out with the baseball Tigers in Detroit and could hit the ball out of the park with the best.

Then along came Wayne Gretzky, and it was as if he had arrived from another planet, or at least from European hockey, as he changed the way the game is played at the forward position. Now it seems as if every player that comes onto the ice is playing in a razzle dazzle fashion with the old saying "stay on your wing" now a thing of the

The first time I refereed a game he played in, I was amazed at his level of intensity. It seemed when he came on the ice for the faceoff he already knew what was going to happen during the ensuing play and usually he made sure he was right. There is a level of electricity on every shift he takes.

The game of hockey has gone through many changes over the years, but it's still a game played by grown boys with a keen sense of fun being their greatest attribute. Two great Canadians who demonstrate this best and have contributed to our great game and to our country, Howe and Gretzky, are both worthy of all the accolades heaped upon them.

Can you imagine Wayne Gretzky not qualifying for Rookie of the Year when he first entered the National Hockey League because he had played in the World Hockey Association? He currently holds 51 records in the NHL and this makes a mockery of the ruling which applied back then. And what now with the Soviet players, all veteran pros, being eligible for the award this season. An oddity? Yes, but not surprising. More on this in another column!
