Councillor wants anti-pollution lottery

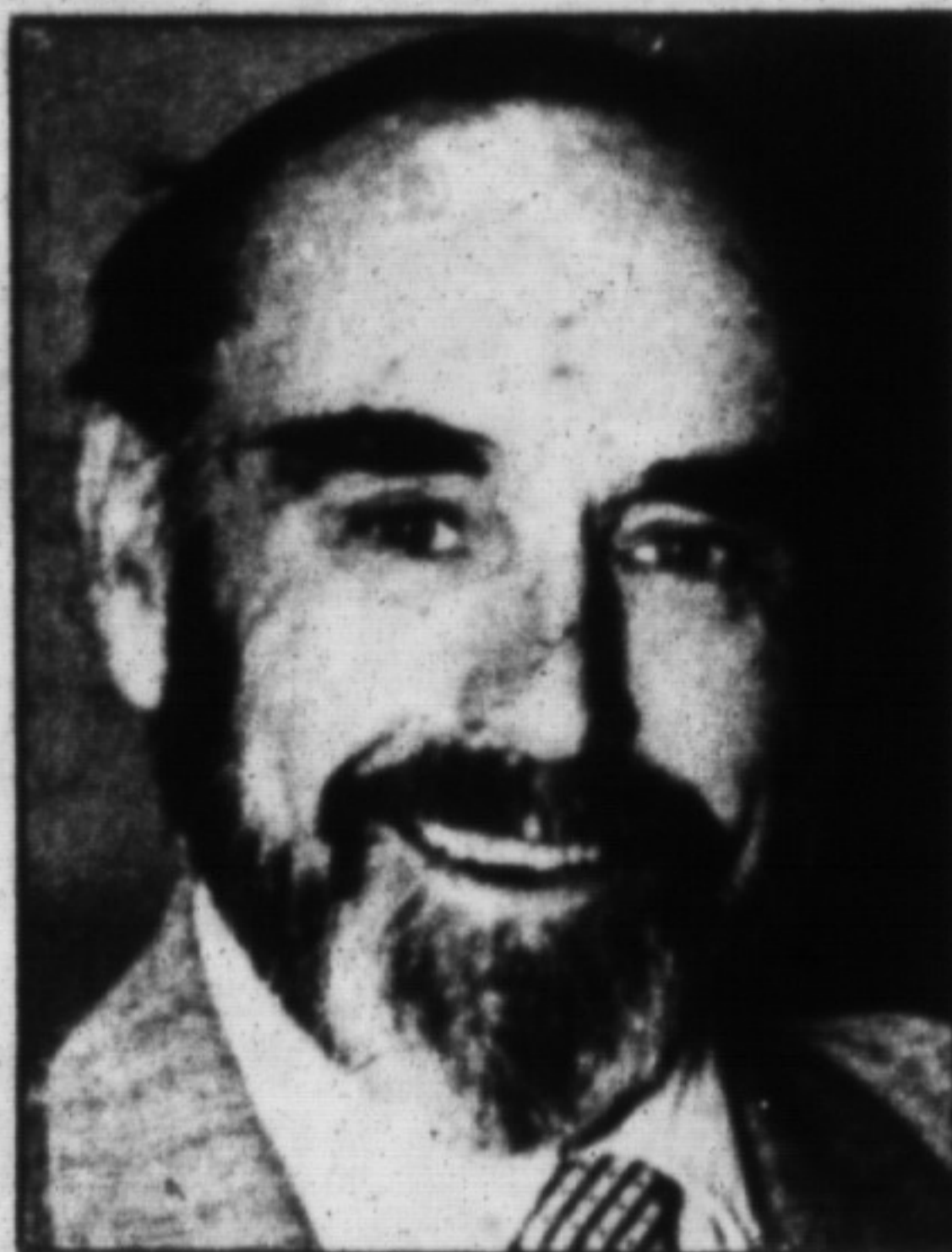

The main hurdles to clear in cleaning up Hamilton Harbor involve jurisdiction, politics and finances, says Halton regional councillor Bill Johnson. Mr. Johnson, of Milton, is the regional representative on the committee looking into harbor pollution.

There are five jurisdictions butting heads over the harbor, according to Mr. Johnson. Halton Region, Hamilton-Wentworth Region and the cities of Hamilton and Burlington are all cooperating on the harbor issue, but the Harbor Board of Commissioners is not, he said.

"If we are to clean up the Hamilton Harbor and maintain the clean-up, a body has to be organized under one mandate," Mr. Johnson said in his report to the Region following meetings of the International Joint Commission on the Great Lakes, held in mid-October.

The organization should consist of the two regions, the two cities and certain interested members at large, according to Mr. Johnson.

The political will to clean up the harbor exists at the local level, according to Mr. Johnson. He cited severe financial restraints as breaking what will there is at the provincial and federal levels of government.

"The environment is given lip ser-

vice until elections are called, and then other issues develop, like free trade, the constitution, GST, and the issue of the environment is placed on the back burner," Mr. Johnson said in his report.

The \$125 million the federal government has committed to cleaning up the Great Lakes is insignificant, according to Mr. Johnson. He said \$10 billion was spent on programs and studies in the last 20 years, with no noticeable effects.

Funds for a clean up could be secured through an international lottery, much the same way that proceeds from Wintario are used for recreation and culture around the province, Mr. Johnson suggested in his report.

He also suggested water for the "Big Pipe" come from Georgian Bay rather than Lake Ontario. The pipe has been proposed as a means to allow massive population growth in Milton, where sewage treatment and water constraints hinder expansion. The quality of the water in Georgian Bay would save considerably on

treatment costs, he predicted.

Mr. Johnson cited the invasion of the Great Lakes by the Zebra mussel as a major problem, "apart from the endless lists of toxic chemicals and the probability of spills." The mussels have plugged intake pipes and screens in the Lakes as well as jammed pumps and caused navigational buoys to sink, the councillor said.

He suggested that treatment of ship ballast tanks to prevent transport of the mussels into the lake system be made mandatory.

Mr. Johnson also said lake freighter cargos must be more rigorously checked for toxic substances.

"The Great Lakes are our wells. By mutual agreement we allow vessels of dubious registration, navigated by officers of equally dubious qualifications, to carry God knows what on our drinking water."
