Selling three socks instead of a pair is their answer to the lost sock syndrome which most everyone who owns a pair suffers from.

A little egging on from their friends was all they needed to market the novelty item. "My friends kept saying to me, It's a great

idea you should do it',"says Mr. Graham.

So they did. Mr. Graham and Mr. Johnson set the wheels in motion and soon after, their product was before their eyes.

Going through the red tape took its toll but gaining the interests of distrubutors was easy, says Mr. Graham.

"The distributors said it was the most imaginative idea since the pet rock," he adds.

3's a Pair are packaged in a box resembling a clothes dryer and they sell for less than \$10. They are black mens' socks and Mr. Graham says they are of excellent quality so the product is practical as well as a novelty item.


Mr. Graham notes that 3's a Pair are environmentally friendly because with an spare sock, there would be less dumped in landfill sites. As well, he says, if you buy two boxes, you get three pairs. They're also great for three-legged races.

The boxes of socks will be available in department stores in the near future. Other 3's a Pair products are in the process of being developed as well.
