In mid-June town council passed a no-smoking bylaw, banning smoking in municipal buildings, shops and just about anywhere substantial numbers of people gather.

Also in mid-June, two young Milton women, Lorraine Gregory, 20, and Deborah Smith, 19, were killed when their car was hit by one driven by John Lake, 37, of Oakville. Mr. Lake was charged with various offences relating to impaired driving causing death. He was found guilty late in the year and awaits sentencing.

In July Milton Rotary Club members and municipal officials finally laid the cornerstone for the club's long-awaited affordable housing complex, a 26-unit building, in urban Milton.

In mid-July one route of appeal against the decision to saddle Milton with Halton's landfill was closed when the provincial Cabinet upheld a hearing board decision choosing the town.

In August fugitive Robert Louis Adams, 25, who escaped from police in late July, was spotted in Nova Scotia. Mr. Adams, a former Milton resident, later died in a helicopter crash after being captured by American authorities. He was taken after being wounded in a gun battle with an American civilian.

On Aug. 10 Halton Adolescent Support Services personnel and local officials turn the sod for the organization's new group home in urban Milton.

In late August Leslie McLean pleaded guilty to a reduced charge of manslaughter in the stabbing death of her husband, Bill McLean. She was sentenced to five years in jail.

Municipal council erupted in controversy over spending policies, with councillor Bruce Attenborough leading the charge against having taxpayers shell out for the travel expenses of spouses of town staff and elected officials travelling on municipal business. Eventually that policy was scrapped, and spouses no longer receive any travel funds from the town.
