

Karmax midgets capture Georgetown trophy

Milton Karmax major AA midgets captured the flag in the 24th annual Georgetown tournament last weekend.

Milton overpowered Acton 5-0 in the first game of the tournament. David McDuffe took a Pat Henneberry pass and staked Milton to a 1-0 lead; all they would need in the game.

Trevor Brandt converted a play from Rob Crowe and McDuffe and Ian Ellis added to the Milton lead when he collected a marker from Gio Piazza and McDuffe.

Piazza then popped home a goal with assist going to Ellis and Scot Woods for a 4-0 Milton lead. Chris Check finished the scoring thanks to a Darren Bain pass.

McDuffe was named the game's MVP and goalie Richard Saliba earned a shutout.

Milton next met Mississauga Braves. The Braves scored first but Mike Cox evened it up with an unassisted effort. Kevin Davidson gave Milton a 2-1 lead when he converted a play from Sean Williams and Henneberry near the end of the first period.

Mississauga worked hard in the second period and scored three times to take the lead 4-2. Crowe scored from Check with 11 seconds remaining in the second frame to bring the lead down to one. Milton came out flying in the third period and Peddie shut the door on Mississauga.

Williams scored with assists going to Crowe and Henneberry. Piazza then popped the winner from Check and McDuffe and Brandt capped the scoring with an empty netter to

finish the scoring 6-4 Milton. Henneberry was named game MVP.

Milton's next assignment was Ajax. This game was a close-checking affair with no scoring until Milton notched two power-play goals in the middle frame. Rob Del Papa scored from Damien Dubien and Piazza while Check scored from Cox and McDuffe.

Ajax scored early in the third but Milton held on to win 2-1. Saliba played well in goal and Brandt was named game MVP.

The championship game matched Sudbury Lakers who had defeated the host Georgetown team 7-3 and Milton who were undefeated in preliminary play. Sudbury was a fast-skating, high-scoring team but Milton's hitting wore them down.

The Northmen took the lead on a power-play goal in the first period.

Milton responded in the second period with two power-play goals of their own. McDuffe scored from Del Papa and Brandt popped one from Cox to make it 2-1.

Milton collected an insurance goal early in the third period when Del Papa scored from Check and McDuffe. Hard work by all and excellent goaltending by Peddie preserved the well-deserved championship win.

Del Papa was picked the Milton MVP for the game. McDuffe was picked for the all-star team and was selected as the tournament's MVP. Peter McDuffe was named all-star coach in what amounted to a good way to begin the new year for the Milton midgets.
