Ski area has best Christmas

Glen Eden Ski Area broke records for attendance over the Christmas holidays.

The Milton facility, which also sold out four ski programs, had its best Christmas season ever.

While some credit goes to Mother Nature for the white Christmas, most of it belongs to the snowmaking crew, said Bob Falle of Glen Eden.

The staff worked with the ski area's new \$1 million snowmaking system to cover the slopes in record time.
