Hollywood Beat with DAVID GIAMMARCO

Matt Dillon relishes role

Actor Matt Dillon, who was in Toronto recently for his new film Drugstore Cowboy, projects an incredibly energized persona, even when he's sitting still in the most calm, passive state.

He possesses a genuinely pleasant and charming aura, yet all the while maintains a very elusive edge especially in interviews.

Drugstore Cowboy sees Dillon playing a surprisingly vivacious drug addict. It's a powerful and stylish story of a junkie's life of crime and redemption in the 1970s.

In a highly striking and sometimes amusing picture of the ups and downs of a drug addict's perception of the world, Dillon relished the part as a break in his usual tough-guy characters.

"It's more challenging as an actor to do something like that," Dillon says about Drugstore Cowboy, "It's something where people appreciate you branching out and doing something risky."

Drugstore Cowboy is based on a novel written by an actual drug addict, James Fogel, who is currently serving a 10-year prison term for his similar drugstore robberies.

"I liked it because it was very unique and very personal - based on personal experiences, reflects Dillon on his admiration for the script. "It wasn't just some screenwriter who decided one day to write a movie about drug addicts."

In researching his part, Dillon, travelled around drug-infested parts of cities, even going to Harlem with a friend who was a recovering addict.

"But I'm not going to pretend like I had to do a lot of research because I know people who were drug addicts," admits Dillon. "I had a friend who overdosed when he was in high school."

And after critically acclaimed roles in such recent films as The Flamingo Kid and The Big Town and onstage in The Boys Of Winter, Dillon found this part in Drugstore Cowboy the most difficult.

"The toughest part was actually having to go inside myself and find that obsessive/compulsive part of me. Actually, it was tougher when we were researching the film because I found I got really obsessive and was constantly thinking about the film."




