

Soccer Gunners claim draw in Premier action

A much improved Milton Honda Gunners managed a 4-4 tie with Ontario Bus in the Premier Division of the Mississauga Indoor Soccer League last weekend.

Paul Nolan popped the opening goal of the contest in the seventh minute of play with assists going to Bert Corsini and John Davis. In the 11th minute Davis added to the Milton lead with a goal assisted by Gerry Hearney.

Ontario Bus presently in last place in the loop were not to be outdone. They rallied with goals in the 16th minute and the 20th minute to force the score to a pair apiece at the half.

Ontario Bus went ahead in the fourth minute of the second half but moments later the newest Milton Gunner Steve Smith zipped home the tying marker. An assist went to Davis.

In the seventh minute Kevin Griffin pushed the Gunners into the lead but Ontario Bus tied it in

the eighth minute at 4-4. Milton managed a goal in the 16th minute but it was disallowed for goaltender interference.

John Davis managed three points in the contest and has played extremely well along side teammates Kevin Griffin, Andy Nolan and Paul Dolan. "Davis is a 90 minute player and what he lacks in skill he more than makes up for with effort," said club president Griffin.

Drury wrestlers finish second at tournament

The E.C. Drury High School wrestlers got the year off to a good start in the White Oaks Invitational Tournament, taking second place among more than a dozen schools.

Despite undergoing a major rebuilding year and being shorthanded due to upcoming exams, the Spartans managed a truly satisfactory finish, losing only to White Oaks (Oakville), the new powerhouse of Halton wrestling.

Drury entered 12 grapplers and put eight of them into the final round. Drury's outstanding wrestler, was sophomore Chris Spence, who dominated four consecutive matches to take the 119-pound title. Spence extended his team leading record to 16-4.

Also winning golds, their first of the year, were Brent Pickett (14-5) in the 84-pound division and John Stevenson in the 90-pound division. Dave Wilson also ran his win total to 14 (second best on the team) by going 2-1 to capture a silver. Wilson's gold medal loss in the 149-pound division was a close, one point decision to White Oaks rival James Bongard.

Lee Black also earned his 14th win, going 3-1, to place third at 104 pounds. Black's win for bronze was over teammate Dustin DeJorey, who settled for fourth. Also placing fourth were Colin Widdis and Trevor Brent.

Masters meet

A team of swimmers from the Milton Masters Aquatic Club represented their club well at the Alderwood Masters Swim Meet in Etobicoke. Twenty-five aquatic clubs from all over southern Ontario sent their masters swimmers to compete.

Top performer of the day for Milton was Anna Morris, who took home a first place ribbon in the 50-yard breaststroke (42.45 seconds) and three second place ribbons for the 50-yard freestyle (32.30), 100-yard free (1:11.40) and 200-yard free (2:44.98). She also teamed up with three rookie competitors, Peggy Birnie, Jane Marshall and Kathie Key to win second place honors in the women's 200-yard freestyle relay in a time of 2:20.0.

Kathie Key won a first place ribbon in the novice 50-yard free style (39.50), third in the 50-yard free (40.38) and fourth in the 100-yard free (1:33.85) for her age category. Jane Marshall placed third in the 50-yard freestyle (35.95) for her age category and fourth in the 50-yard breaststroke (48.91). Peggy Birnie also won a third place in her 50-yard freestyle event (37.0) and fourth in 50-yard breast (43.31).

The male contingent of the club was also well represented at the podium. Frank Scanlon won fourth place in both the 50-yard breast (35.40) and the 50-yard backstroke (38.80), fifth place in the 50-yard butterfly (34.10) and 100-yard breast (1:21.75), and seventh in the 50-yard free (30.96).
