Mr. Strain, owner of Creative Memorials on Ontario Street South, had always wanted to follow in his father Gordon's footsteps by making quality memorial stones. And recently he said his 17-year-old daughter, Taya, asked him, "what will it take to run this business?"

In fact, she began working for the company to get her feet wet before she enters college in the fall.

And with 15-year-old son Gordon perhaps waiting in the wings, he chuckled that, "it's truly a third-generation business."

There was never any loubt for Jim. His father and uncle (Frank Swanson) jointly owned Kingsway Monument Works in Toronto, and as a youngster he would ride the granite trucks "trying to keep out of everybody's way."

As a teenager in high school his goal was still firmly focused and after keying in on architectural drafting in college, he joined his father in the business.

Jim's father moved the family to Milton in 1953. 'There were no monument dealers here at that time," he explained. "My dad looked at it and thought it was a good area."

In 1965 Gordon, who was 50 at the time, decided to part ways with his brother Frank and form his own business with Jim, who was 21.

The business, Creative Memorials, prospered and today is one of the three largest companies in the retail monument business in Optario.

Counadentally, at 46 years of age, Jim, like his father, is excited about persuing another opportunity. Following a recent business trip to India, he struck up a deal with an Indianmanufacturer of granite products to become


