



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Halton wants more cop budget control

The police commission, which is responsible for the development of policy and budget, approved a 15 per cent increase that will see the Halton Regional Police Force budget rise to \$31.6 million from the \$27.6 million budgeted last year.

The recommendation approved at Wednesday's council meeting calls for the police commission to be composed of seven members, with the balance tipped in favor of the region - four from regional council and three appointed by the province.

Halton's other representative on the police commission, Burlington councillor James Grieve, also could not "support police service under direct control of local politicians."

However, one aspect of the motion he did agree with was increasing the number of members on the board so that all four Halton muncipalties could be represented by an elected of-

Milton and Halton Hills, he added, "unfortunately have no elected representation on the police commission." (Milton is represented by a provincially appointed member, Jim Watson of Campbellville).

In initiating the motion, Oakville councillor John Graham noted that more than half of the tax supported budget of the region goes towards police services, and that "regional councillors continue to be accountable in elections for a budget which they cannot control."

Currently, the only appeal route for the police budget is to the Ontario Police Commission (OPC).
