## Fluoridation approved for Milton's water supply

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Dr. Pollett requested that the region petition Milton Council to fluoridate its water, but Burlington councillor Walter Mulkewich objected on the grounds that the issue was a regional and not a town mat-

He succeeded in a revised motion that the region would not petition the town, but simply meet with town councillors to discuss the matter.

Regional councillor Brad Clements, although opposed to fluoridation, supported the motion in order to get the issue to Milton council.

Mayor Gord Krantz, who missed the committee meeting, said in a later interview that "I have been and Halton municipalities. still continue to be opposed to One of the report's findings indithe largest majority of Milton residents. That was born out by a referendum a few years ago."

Dr. Pollett, after the meeting, said he is hoping for assistance from the town of Milton in getting the issue before the public.

The October report, indicated that the dental health of Halton's public school children is slightly worse than the provincial average, and that Milton, which is the only Halton municipality that doesn't fluoridate its water, has the poorest record of all

fluoridation of the water and so do cated that 50 per cent of Milton's five-year-old youngsters had never experienced dental problems, not nearly as good as the provincial average of 68 per cent and the regional average of 70 per cent. In comparison with other Halton municipalities, Acton led the way with 78 per cent of their five-year-"Sure, you can have excellent olds being free of, dental disease, followed by Burlington (75 per cent), Oakville (73 per cent) and Georgetown (69 per cent).

'The results are not because of chance," stated Dr. Pollett in his report, "but show statistically that there is a very real difference for the five-year-olds in Milton as compared to the averages of the province."

Dr. Pollett wants fluoridation in the municipal water because it's the best method to ensure pre-school voungsters - who benefit the most from fluoridation - get it.

The staff report elaborated that the sooner the youngster receives fluoride - beginning even in the womb - "the better the foundation and strength of the teeth that are being formed."


Providing fluoride in the water supply is the best method because "other methods of fluoride therapy such as fluoride rinsing programs are not practical with the ages under Kindergarten."

They're not practical because the health department does not come into contact with these youngsters on a regular basis until they enter the school system. And even if they did have access, young preschoolers "are not able to properly rinse and spit
