Survives 45-foot fall from cliff, Burlington man in serious condition

An 18-year-old Burlington youth remains unconscious and in serious condition at Hamilton General Hospital following a hiking accident at Rattlesnake Point in Milton early Saturday evening.

As the sun slowly sank, fire, police and ambulance workers carried the youth up to a Halton Region Conservation Authority vehicle that had driven part way down the path. He was then transferred to the waiting ambulance near the park entrance.

Admitted to Milton District Hospital with a broken neck, severe internal injuries and head injuries, he was later airlifted to Hamilton.

Driver eludes police after wild chase

Police are still looking for the driver of a stolen pick up truck that led them on a wild chase through Milton on the weekend.

Luckily no one was hurt as the vehicle, stolen earlier from a Steeles Avenue home, sped through numerous stop signs and traffic lights.

At one point the driver lost control of the vehicle on Derry Road, blowing the two right tires. Later, on Commercial Street, the suspect rammed into a police cruiser in front of him.

While the suspect reached speeds of 140 kph, police report that the majority of the pursuit occurred between 40 and 60 km/h. Damage to the stolen vehicle was estimated at \$5,000.

The 12-minute chase, which started just after 2 a.m. Sunday morning, ended with the suspect turning from Derry Road southbound onto Highway 25 where he stopped the truck half a kilometre from that intersection and ran into a wooded area.

Officers from the two cruisers involved in the chase pursued the suspect on foot but came up empty handed.

Police started following the vehicle when it ran a stop sign on Wilson Drive.

The rest of the chase involved an extensive tour of Milton with many stop signs and red lights missed, and with the vehicle often driving in the wrong
