Skating director keeps her edge

"I read anything to do with CFSA," replied Patti Restivo when I questioned her about her reading habits.

CFSA is the Canadian Figure Skating Association and this sport has

played a big part in Mrs. Restivo's life for the last 11 years. Her 14year-old daughter has been skating since she was three years old.

"When Cecily got into skating, l wanted to find

out all about it." Mrs. Restivo admits she still has a lot to learn about the sport. She's been a member of the Milton Figure Skating Club's board of directors for seven years. In May she finishes her second year as president.

"When I have had the time to read lately I have been studying the accounting course offered by the CFSA. Last week I mailed off my latest exam. It took me a total of 24 hours to complete over the period of two weeks. If I pass it - and that means getting at least 75 per cent on each of the eight questions - I'll be able to do accounting at figure skating competitions above the club level."

In figure skating, accountants play an important role. Once judges have placed the skaters, the scoresheets are given to the accountants who then determine the winners.

Mrs. Restivo reads the quarterly publications published by the CFSA and the Central Ontario Section (of the CFSA). She regretted that there were so few publications that dealth with figure skating.

Until last year, Mrs. Restivo, an interior decorator, held jobs at The Bay and Simpsons.

"I began to resent the time I was. spending at my job so I finally quit last June so I could put all my efforts into being president of the Milton club. I also spend a lot of time taking Cecily to her skating lessons and competitions."

Once Mrs. Restivo retires as president this spring, she plans to continue co-ordinating the skater development program which sponsors classroom and on-ice seminars.

As we were talking, Mrs. Restivo remembered a book she had received

as a Christmas gift. 'I'm reading All I Really Need to Know I Learned in Kindergarten by Robert Fulghum. It's on my bedside table so I pick it up and read the occasional anecdote. I'm really enjoying it, In fact, I bought a copy for my mother. A friend once narrated a section of the book to me and I especially liked listening to Fulghum's way of expressing himself."

Mrs. Restivo also chooses authors like Judith Krantz. "I want to read novels that let me escape. Life is hard enough. I prefer something light that isn't depressing."
