a company statement, released just prior to Wednesday's regional council meeting where it was to have been discussed.

The Toronto area's mounting garbage problems have been highly publicized of late, and Dufferin Aggregates, through its parent company St. Lawrence Cement, thought it had the ideal solution. It proposed to replace the aggragate it takes out of its Milton quarry with Toronto area garbage.

The company believed all parties would benefit - the Toronto area would have a safe place for its garbage, and the host municipalities would reap in profits that could reach \$1 billion.

"We offered this opportunity to the community through the elected representatives of Milton, Halton Hills and Halton Region with the caveat that if the community officals did not support our plan we would not pursue it," indicated the statement.

"After presenting our plan through formal channels, it has become clear that sufficient municipal support is not forthcoming."

The company's belief in its proposal, however, remains unchanged. It contends that:

· "waste disposal is not a problem that will go away."

· "tests proved that our plan is environmentally friendly and a better solution than taking productive farm land out of production and turning it into a garbage dump."

· "this community could benefit from the non-tax dollars that it would receive as partners in this opportunity."

· "as a corporate citizen, whose family of employees live and work in this community, we have a responsibility to involve ourselves in the challenge of dealing with waste."

Company officials indicated they would be willing to attend a committee meeting if councillors had any questions regarding the statement.


The flowers will be delivered on Friday May 11, just in time for Mother's Day.
