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

North Halton to have triple-A rep hockey

The 1990-91 season will see the birth of triple-A minor hockey in the Milton area.

Wayne Pries, chairman of the committee overseeing the move, said agreement to the plan exists in principle from all associations involved.

The Halton Triple-A Hockey Alliance will draw players from a zone stretching from Flamborough to Orangeville. The geographical area of the zone is determined by population and existing playing patterns.

Double-A and single-A teams in each community will maintain their present local structure, Pries said. 'It's every boy's dream to play triple-A hockey. We want to give everybody the opportunity to play to the highest level."

Pries said the zone is large geo-/ graphically, but a population of 90,000 to 125,000 is required by the Ontario Minor Hockey Association (OMHA) in the zone plan. Eventually the entire province will be included in triple-A zones.

Presently a 50,000 base population is required for triple-A recognition and then only with a solid record of treading on anyone's toes. success at double-A.

"There are centres with 80,000 people who struggle at double-A," Pries said. "They don't even attempt to move up."

It is hoped that with the opportunity to play triple-A hockey ,local players will stay local and not try to bend the rules by playing with other associations, Pries said. Players have been known to 'acquire' Toronto addresses and then travel to the games from outside the Toronto area. It is not unknown for families to pull up Halton Hurricanes. stakes merely so the children can

Milton's stance. Talks with MMHA president Terry Brandt have produced an agreement in principle to the plan, Pries said.

According to Pries the OMHA began implementation of the zone concept for triple-A last year when a number of zones were formed north of Toronto. Richmond Hill, Vaughn and Simcoe were included in one such zone. The success of those projects has led to the same thing happening here.

'The whole thing has been in the works for four or five years," Pries

A survey by the Canadian Amateur Hockey Association (CAHA) in 1984 prompted Pries to write a letter in December of that year to OMHA suggesting the zone alignments at triple-A.

Enough ice time is presently available in Milton and Georgetown and the probable centres for the 11 teams that will give the area a full slate of triple-A squads. Pries, said more ice time would be nice but they do have enough to begin the process without

"Some (classifications), like minor novice, major midget and juvenile have very few teams at the triple-A level throughout the province, so we will have to look closely at exactly what teams we want to include," Pries said.

'It will take the cream off the top of the present teams, but if it serves to keep the kids here then so be it," he added.

The Halton Triple-A Hockey Alliance teams will be known as the
