"These vendor take-back mortgages can knock off hundreds of dollars from the monthly costs of carrying a home."

To make their housing dollars go

further, some purchasers have of Montreal, for example, offers oneteamed up with friends or family members to buy a home that would otherwise be out of their reach.

"Done properly, these arrangements make a lot of sense and I've seen them work out beautifully," Mrs. Francis says.

Banks, too, are helping out by offering home ownership savings plans for first-time buyers. The Bank

quarter percentage point off the first \$75,000 of mortgage for customers in the plan.

Deductions in the plan itself are tax deductible and if the house bought with the plan costs \$200,000 or less, customers get a portion of the land transfer tax back.

Mary Perley, a loan officer with the Bank of Montreal, says the bank works closely with customers to help them complete their purchases.

"We're very involved with customers, throughout the home-buying process," she says.

"For many people, especially firsttime buyers, buying a home can be scary - but we're there for them. In fact, I've seen mortgages approved in just one hour."

There is room for optimism in the current real estate market, says Mrs. Francis.

April's \$41.7 million volume of sales is only slightly lower than last April's total of \$44.7 million.

While, the number of properties entering the market in April has increased 20 per cent over one year ago, the number sold has risen by 13 per cent.

"Moderately priced homes are still selling well, with most of our sales in the \$150,000 to \$250,000 range," she

Under the right conditions, now is an excellent time to buy."

In Milton, sales held steady last month with a total volume of \$5.8 million, says Mark Mallalieu, local real estate broker and board vicepresident.
