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Exhibitors gain despite smaller Showcase turnout

Organizers of this year's Milton Showcase held on the weekend are calling the event a great success even though attendance was down considerably from 1988.

The exhibition by more than 140 local merchants was especially successful from an exhibitor's point of view, said Peter McCuaig, Showcase chairman.

Because the aisles were less crowded, he said, visitors to the show avoided getting lost in the shuffle and were able to receive more personal attention.

In turn, local business was well promoted and exhibitors established good contacts at the Memorial Arena event, he said.

Showcase happened to fall on one of the warmest weekends so far this spring which may have contributed to the decline in attendance, said Mr. McCuaig.

Consultant hired to raise \$1.7 million for rec centre

A professional fundraising company will drum up contributions for new leisure services centre roject and Monday night at municipal council Ronald McClory, president of The Martin Group, did everything but guarantee success.

And that is a tall order, if the initial

skepticism of municipal councillors is warranted. Mr. McClory plans to raise \$1.7 million in 14 months, a sprint through the often difficult field of charitable donations that would mean all the private money the Town needs for the centre would be in place. The remainder of the \$8.4 million budget is provided by various levels of government.

The flagship leisure services centre, to be built beside the new Bishop Reding Roman Catholic Secondary School on Main Street just east of Thompson Road, will house a 25metre pool, a gynasium, a fitness centre and a meeting room. It is Milton's most ambitious recreation project to date, and the fundraising goal is also the community's most ambitious, eclipsing the \$1.3 million raised for Milton District Hospital's new wing.

Mr. McClory is undaunted by the challenge. In somewhere between 70 and 80 fundraising projects The Martin Group has known nothing but achievement, he said. "I can look you clearly in the eye and say we have
