Barking up the wrong tree

Some Hamilton-area adults were apparently barking up the wrong tree in their efforts to obtain some trees.

Following a tip from a concerned citizen early in the morning of May 22, Halton Regional Police responded to Environs Landscape on Twiss Road in Milton, where a search revealed a vehicle loaded with approximately 15 trees and shrubs.

A short distance away a group of five Hamilton men, all in their late teens and early 20s, were located.

Police said three of them - who work for a Hamilton landscaping company - were charged with theft.

Fatal accident

A 42-year-old Georgetown mother and her 14-year-old daughter were killed and another 16-year-old daughter critically injured as a result of a two-vehicle collision in Halton Hills Saturday morning.

Police Blotter

A 20-year-old Toronto man faces several charges in connection with the incident, including criminal negligence causing death possession of a narcotic and driving while under suspension.

Police said the accident, on Guelph Street east of Hall Road, occurred when a 1987 Ford crossed into the eastbound lane, colliding head-on with a 1988 Pontiac.

The driver and one passenger in the Pontiac - Sheila Bull, 42, and her daughter, Amanda, 14 - were pronounced dead at the scene.




