## Red Sox slip to 0-4 with 5-0 loss

Glen Turner must be getting sick of saying "it was a close game."

The Milton Red Sox, whom Turner manages, have carefully forged an 0-4 record to kick off their 1990 Central Ontario Baseball Association (COBA) senior season.

Wednesday night at Nelson Park in Burlington, the Red Sox came out 5-0 losers in a game where Burlington rode a 3-0 first inning lead until they managed another pair of runs in the seventh to salt the win away.

The Brants improved their record to 3-1.

"(Gerry) Milne had sun problems in the first inning," said Turner of his starting pitcher, "and he let it bother him. After that they didn't do to much."

Milne walked four in the first and gave up two hits while Burlington scored three. It could have been worse but for John Turner turning an unassisted double play at third with the bases loaded and none out.

He corralled a soft liner and beat Todd Langstaff to the base. After that, Milne only allowed three hits before being pulled with two out

and two on in the seventh.

"For the last four or five years we've been slow starters," said Burlington manager Dean Howard, "so I'm real happy to be 3-1. We're a real good hitting team and we're not hitting but we're still winning, so I'm happy."

Burlington starter Ken Kennedy pitched five shutout innings with the help of some fine defence, which turned a rare third to first and back to third (5-3-5) double play as well as making a couple of fine running catches in the outfield.

Shaun Kang came in relief to shut Milton down over three innings before giving way to Dennis Reynolds in the ninth, who retired the side in order.

Burlington pitchers only allowed four hits but struck out 13 while walking only three. Their Milton counterparts gave up five hits, seven walks and struck out three.

"Kang had us off balance with his breaking pitch," said Turner. "We've got to get some bats into the lineup. Four hits is not a lot of production."

Howard refused to make a prediction on the defending champion Brants' 1990 finish.

"I don't make predictions; they come back to haunt you. We'll do extremely well, though." That can only mean a 1990 COBA title for the Burlington Brants.

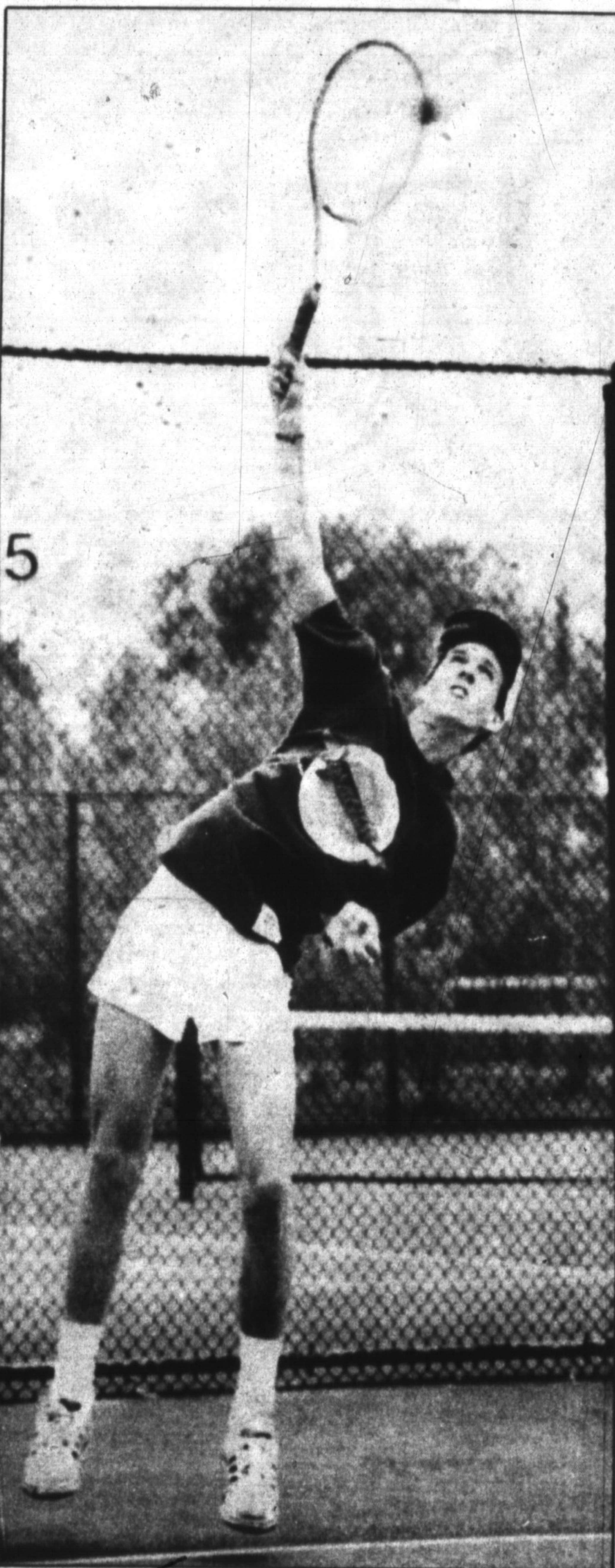

## Van Cedar leads MDHS to OFSAA

Marsha Van Cedar of Milton District High School will lead her team into the OFSAA (Ontario Federation of Schools Athletics Association) Track and Field Championships in Sudbury this weekend.

Van Cedar qualified for OFSAA in the junior girls javelin event at the South Region Meet at McMaster University last week.

The regionals are preceded by the Halton Track and Field Championships and the GHAC (Golden Horse-

shoe Athletic Conference) Track and Field Championships on the ladder of qualifying for a chance at the all-Ontario OFSAA crown.

Van Cedar's toss of 33.04 metres was her personal best in the event and earned her a gold medal.

She also broke the MDHS record for the 80 metre hurdles, finishing in 12.87 seconds in one of her heats, but she failed to qualify for OFSAA, which required a top-four finish.

Van Cedar was chosen MVP for

track, and junior volleyball at the school's athletic banquet Tuesday, and was also named junior athlete of the year.

Robin Leworthy qualified in the junior girls division for both the javelin and discus after claiming third-place finishes in both events. MDHS track coach Pat Burroughs said Leworthy is aiming for a top-10 finish at OFSAA, a respectable showing.

Carla Johnson qualified for OFSAA in the 300 metre hurdles, a new event this year. Her 42.82 seconds at the regional meet established an MDHS record. She finished third.

Sean Faulknor set a goal of 11.5 seconds in the 100 metre sprint at the beginning of the season. He reached the mark at the regional meet in finishing fourth and qualifying for OFSAA.

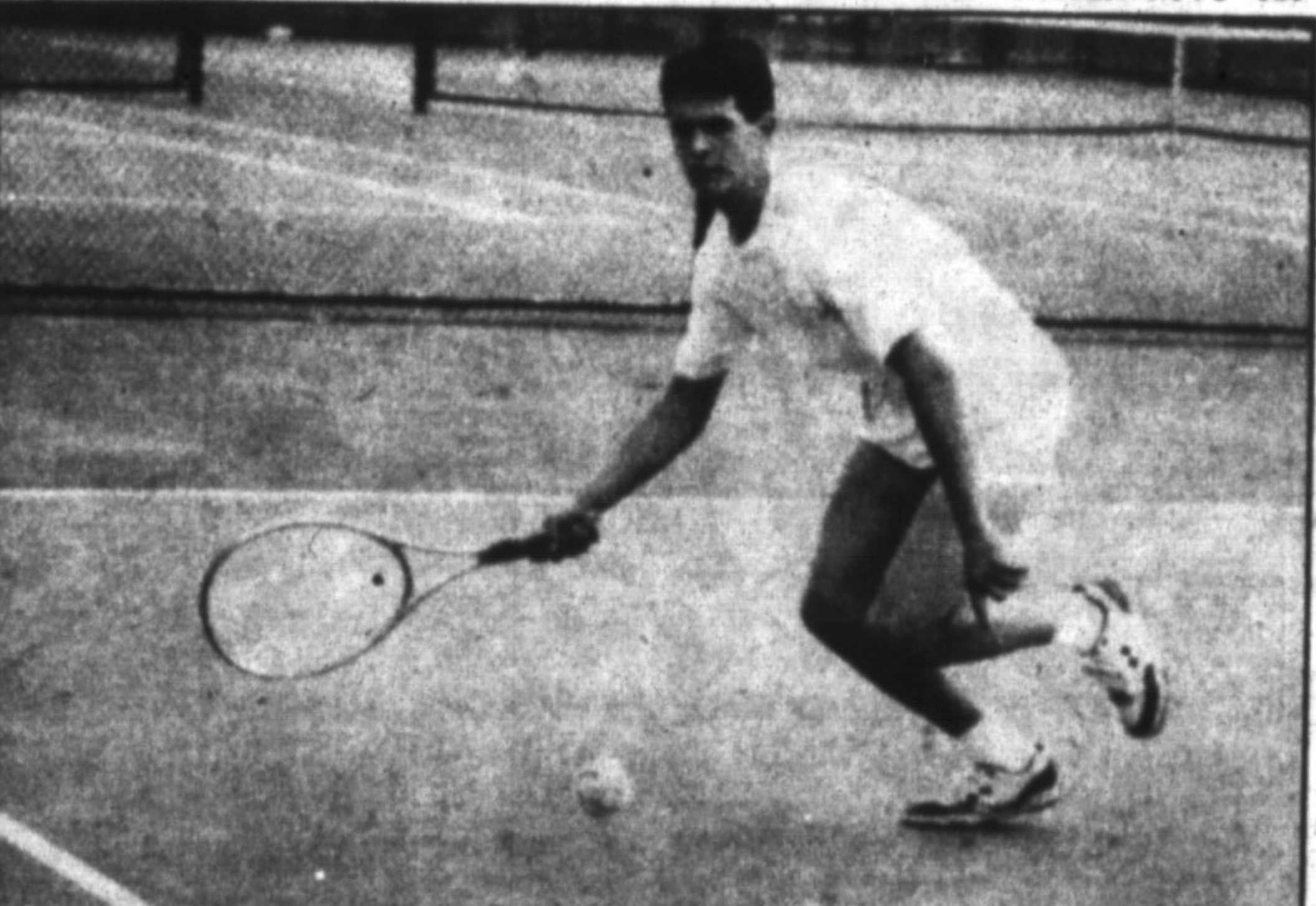
Faulknor was also named boys MVP for track and MVP in junior volleyball at the recent awards ceremony.

He holds the MDHS record in the 200 metres, the 80 metre hurdles and is a member of the record holding 4 x 100 relay team of Will Gearin, Paul Ouellette and Andy Coulson.

Carla Johnson managed a personal best of 9.45 metres in the triple jump but failed to qualify.

Christy Picard, eighth in Ontario last year in the high jump, was fifth in the high jump at the regional meet and failed to qualify for Sudbury.

The MDHS team will travel by bus to Sudbury with the Georgetown contingent. They are staying at Laurentian University, where most of the events will take place.
