



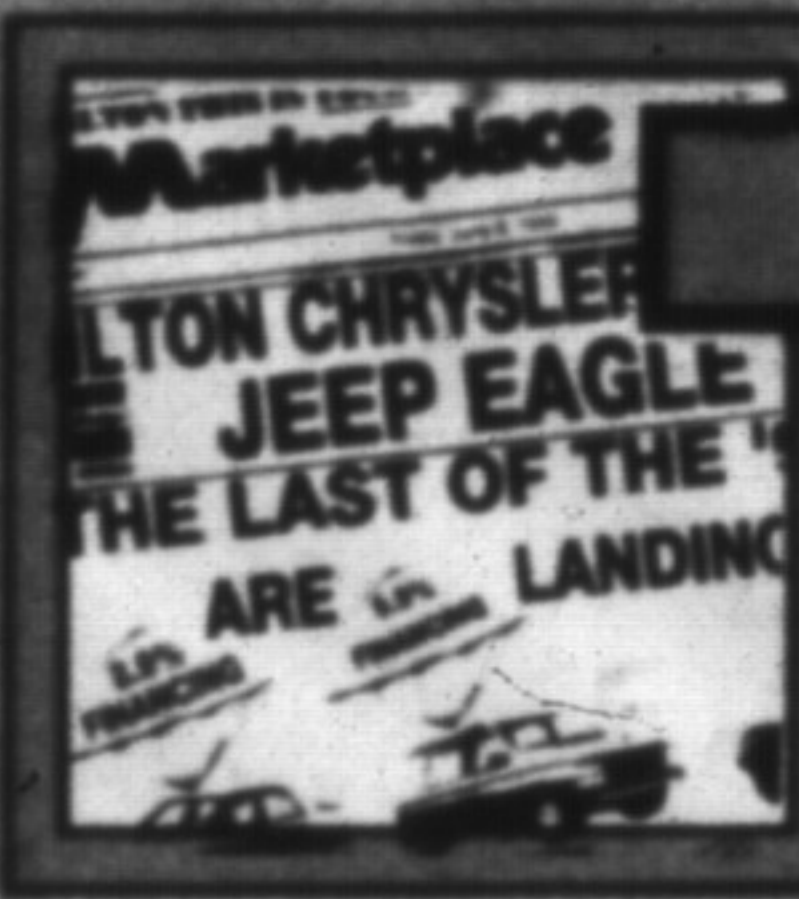

Fair on tomorrow

The traditional Nassagaweya Fair is on tomorrow (Saturday), rain or shine.

Full of fun, prizes and plenty to eat, the fair at Brookville School on Guelph Line opens at 10 a.m. and runs until 3 p.m.

"Traditionally, it is an event Brookville School families and all Nassagaweya residents look forward to for the fun and the chance to meet neighbours and old friends," said Ron Hunsinger, fair chairman.

Highlights include hot air balloon rides (weather permitting), which begin before the fair starts at 7:30 a.m.

A bike rodeo and lip sync air band finals are on the agenda, and Halton County Dairy Princess Sandi Brander is scheduled to appear.

Admission is free.

Luke is four years old, with blond hair, brown eyes — and cute. His photo is the kind that will circulate through a business and temporarily halt work while employees stop to admire.

That picture is now commonplace in Milton, peering out from the Baker's Dozen, Gino's Pizza, Fifth Wheel Truck Stop, the Milton detachment of Halton Regional Police, and so on.

It's becoming more commonplace throughout Ontario and Canada.

Janet hopes it will help bring her son back home. She hasn't seen him since Friday, April 22.

That's when her husband picked Luke up, as he did every second weekend at 7 p.m. on Friday, according to the terms of a custody agreement. Only this time he didn't return with the boy at 7 p.m. on Sunday, as the custody agreement also stipulated.

Instead, there was a man at the door she had never seen before, she recalled, delivering a letter announcing that Luke had been taken away.
