W.I. Dick girls pick up 11 track golds

The W.I. Dick Middle School girls track and field team combined 11 firsts, eight seconds and 10 thirds with the outstanding accomplishments of the boys team to make it the best day on the track for the Wildcats in 10 years.

In the May 31 event Kelly Douglas led the junior division team in scoring with two firsts, one in the 400 metre race and the other in the 800. She finished the 400 in a new meet record of 1:10.17 and the 800 metres she finished in 2:47.

Douglas also managed a third in the triple jump leaping 7.97 metres. The triple jump competition was immediately preceded by the 800 metre run. She was a full metre short of her personal best in the event.

Teammate Christy Hasselfeldt placed first in the 1500 metres in 5:56 and second in the 800 metres with a time of 2:56 right behind Douglas. Rebecca McTrach was also a double ribbon winner with a third in high jump clearing 1.25 metres and a second in the 100 metre dash finishing in 14.68 seconds.

Laura Sipes broke the school record in triple jump with a second place finish on a jump of 8.14 metres. Renee Ross added a third in the 100 metre race with a time of 14.7 seconds and Corinne Jeffrey earned a second in shot put.

Wildcats boys team captures 38 ribbons across 31 events

The W.I. Dick Wildcat track and field team had a most impressive outing on May 31 at the North Halton Track and Field competition. The Wildcats took overall honours by winning two of the four age and gender divisions.

Coming off a very successful evening at the Burlington Relays the previous Friday, W.I. Dick athletes dominated their competition in the junior and intermediate divisions.

In the boys competition a total of 38 ribbons were earned in 31 events entered. Mike Armstrong returned with a red, blue and white ribbon placing first in high jump at 1.25 metres, second in the long jump at 3.85 metres, and third in the 100 metre sprint in 15.5 seconds in the bantam age group.

Colin Bletsos was one of three Wildcats who placed first in the long jump event. Colin missed the W.I. Dick School record by only one centimetre by jumping 4.04 metres. Shawn Gregory completed the bantam boys' point total with a second place in high jump.

The pennant winning junior boys

team was led by Rob-Hans who had an impressive day by placing first in high jump with a leap of 1.42 metres, first in long jump at 4.35 metres and triple jump where he established a new school record at 9.34 metres.

Jim Leworthy won the 400 metre race crossing the line in 1:06.88. He placed second in the 200 metre event with a 29.61 clocking and he finished fourth in the 100 metre dash with a 14.8 second time.

Justin Lynch ran his 800 metres in 2:44.6 to place second. Andrew Hartholt finished third in the junior boys high jump with a leap of 1.35 metres. Devin Richardson had an impressive debut in the shot put event finishing third with a toss of 9.64 metres while teammate Brett Lewis won the Junior boys shot put with a throw of 10.34 metres.

W.I. Dick's strongest boys division was the intermediate age group. In the nine events entered the team picked up five firsts, four seconds and seven thirds. Only one of the 12 athletes entered wasn't a ribbon winner.

Russell Fleming inspired his team when he shattered the 800 metre

record set in 1982 of 2:20.06 in a winning time of 2:18.16. It was evident from the report of the starter's pistol that Fleming was gunning for the record. Coach Ross and Fleming had agreed that by stepping out of the 1500 metre race earlier in the day Fleming could marshal all his efforts on the 800 and 400 metre events.

His 400 metre split of 1:04 let everyone know that a sub 2:20 race was possible. His nearest competition was 30 metres behind him as he entered the final straight. Even after setting such a fast pace for the first lap, Fleming was still able to put on a finishing kick which brought him to the tape in record time.

Less than an hour earlier he had won the 400 metre event in 1:00.24 a mere three tenths of a second off the existing record.

Teammate Chris Browning contributed two firsts by winning the 200 metre race in a time of 27.8. Browning also won the triple jump with a leap of 9.61 metres.

Ryan Finn had an impressive long jump of 4.94 metres which enabled him to place first in the final boys

event of the day. In a photo finish in the intermediate boys 1500 metre race the Milec twins Darryl and Nolan placed second and third respectively with times of 5:16.2 and 5:16.5. In his second event of the meet Darryl placed third in the 800 metres race with a time of 2:39.31.

Jim Fay was a double ribbon winner with a second place 4.64 metre long jump and a high jump of 1.40 metres placed him third.

Matt MacIntosh jumped 9.46 metres to place second in the triple jump and Daryl Loader's toss of 12.93 metres in the shot put also placed him second.

Third place ribbons were earned by Deryk Heraux with a 13.4 in the 100 metres and a 28.3 seconds in the 200 metre race. Browning picked up a third place in the 400 metres with a 1:03.8 time and Ron Flanagan threw the shot 11.53 metres for third place.

The senior division was led by David Bean who won the 400 metre in 1:00.7 and placed second in the 800 metre in 2:29.6 and also second in the 200 metre with a time of 27.0 seconds.
