## Final eliminations underway

The Burlington Pacing Stakes, one of the last major tune-ups before Canada's richest harness race, the \$1-million North American Cup attracted a record 33 starters for Saturday's eliminations at Greenwood Raceway.

The stake for sophomore colts divided into four \$25,000 eliminations with the top two finishers from each plus one third place finisher advancing to the \$214,000 final on June 9.

In 1988 Yves Filion won the Burlington Stakes and The North American Cup with his star pacer Runnymede Lobell. Filion would like to duplicate those results with his sophomore No Taste.

No Taste mastered the first hurdle enroute to The Cup as he paced to a 1:55.4 neck victory over General Trull in the first Burlington elimination and earned his spot in the final.

General Trull set the tone for a 27.5 second opening panel, a 57 second half, before No Taste took over for a 1:25.4 three quarters. General Trull and driver Dave Wall regained the lead briefly midstretch but at the wire No Taste was the best.

"He went a nice mile," commented Filion, "he had to work in the stretch and he'll have to improve to race in the Cup."

For No Taste, a son of No Nukes it was his seventh win in 14 starts

Seltzer Blue) and get spotted," said Kerwood.

The plan proved to be a winning one. It was his third win on the season in 18 starts and incresed his purse account to \$78,900. Chefs Magic is owned by Lillian Pereira and Monico Stanislao of Plainfield. "You'll hear from this horse in the final," forewarned Kerwood.

Favourite Jake and Elwood paced a career best 1:53.4 mile in grinding out a victory in the fourth Burlington elimination for driver Doug Brown


The Samadhi colt had to work to get to the front past an opening quarter commanded by King


"I used him pretty well in the opening quarter," said Brown, I didn't want to race him that tough."


