

Peewees' five-game streak snapped by Erin Mills

Milton Honda minor peewee reps hosted a thrilling 2-1 win over Burlington in baseball action at Rotary Park May 28.

Pat Lynch went the distance on a fine four hitter for the win. Defense sparked on both teams in a very entertaining contest. The play of the game was a great reflex move by Milton shortstop Jimmy Sailer to catch a line drive in the first inning.

Jason Neal carried the offence with a first inning triple to score on Adam Grigor's RBI single, before adding an exciting inside the park home run in the third.

Two days later Brampton visited Milton and left 9-4 losers as Milton Honda stretched its record to 5-0. Jeff Langille went the distance on a six hitter for the win, helped by an 11 hit offence.

Grant Williamson drove in a pair of runs on a towering double to deep left in the first to help build a 5-1 lead. Mike Armstrong chipped in with three singles. Jason Neal, Pat Lynch and Jeff Langille added two singles each.

Milton Honda visited Erin Mills June 4 and took an 11-8 loss to end their perfect record. Four runs in the fourth helped by four walks put the game effectively out of reach for Erin Mills.

Nick Aalbers and Langille each had a pair of RBIs for Milton while Neal and Grigor each scored twice.

Two days later the slide continued as Milton visited Bloor and lost 6-1. After Lynch scored on Armstrong's RBI single to tie the game at one in the second inning, Bloor came right back with four runs in their half of the inning to blow it open.

Milton's Seavey Wedding won the A championship at a tournament in Newmarket on June 5. Enroute to the final against Richmond Hill, Milton defeated Guelph 13-2 and North Toronto 11-2.

In the opener, called after four and a half innings, Guelph was out of 11-2 as Milton scored in every half inning. Seven runs came across in a big fourth inning outburst.

Every member of the team contributed to the offence. Jim Fay made the defensive gem of the

In the second game against North Toronto, Milton started out slowly and didn't control the contest until the third inning. Two runs in the sixth and four more in the seventh turned a relatively close game into a one sided affair. Again, excellent pitching by Brown was a real highlight. Jeremy Raffley finished it off for Milton with a scintilla inning.

In the final game against Richmond Hill Milton won a cliff-hanger by a 9-8 tally. Fay completed six innings and pitched a magnificent two hit shutout against a hard hitting Richmond Hill team.

Leader was the offensive star with two singles, a double and a triple. Adam Theburn, Fay and Cameron Davies had two singles each. As in previous games the infield of Theburn, Shane and Jeremy Raffley, Kevin Wilson and Cameron Davies worked well together.

Heading into the last of the seventh Milton led by a 9-0 score. Richmond Hill rallied. Aided by clutch hits, walks, and errors they managed eight runs. With the tying and winning runs on base Brown ended the game when he caught a deep fly ball.

Jeff Chaisson earned a scorching line drive at first base for a spectacular out.

After the offensive display Milton collapsed against Brampton White and managed only a single run to lose 3-1. Nadalin, Loughlin and Rookie battled hard from the hill for the whole seven innings but a lack of offensive support killed the locals.

With their record at 1-5 Milton broke out. They smashed Bloor 21-0, with numerous players contributing to the offence. McKnight smashed a grand slam home run in the outburst.

The locals came right back with a 14 run performance against Oakville's nine to pull back to within one game of .500. It was Oakville's first loss of the season. Nadalin led the way with three hits while Rookie scored three times.

In their eighth game Nadalin Electric hit the .500 mark with an exciting 7-4 win over Burlington. McDonald and Nadalin scored twice each with Chaisson chipping in with a pair of singles and a run scored.

The game was a 3-3 tie going into the final frame. Burlington talked once to grab a lead but the Muskies rallied for four big runs in the bottom of the inning to seal the victory.

In their next game against Stouffville Milton collected their fourth win in a row to push their record to 5-4 when they beat the home side 13-3.

Eric Craig lead the way with a double and a single, while McKnight, Hunt, Forsyth, and Turner all scored runs for the potent Milton squad. McDonald turned a heads-up double

play on a pop up when he wheeled and threw to second to stop the runner.

In a home game on June 4 Milton's Derek Macdonald and David Marshall continued to pitch a masterful two-hitter. Singles by Mike Chaisson, Pat Chaisson, Eddy O'Donnell, and Macdonald, who also had a triple, helped to fuel the offence. Marshall managed to contribute a single and double to the 3-1 winning effort.

Three days later Milton travelled to Etobicoke and took a 6-0 loss as they generated only two hits against a surprising Etobicoke side. Adam Platt and Mike Chaisson managed the only Milton offence.

The Lions may have had the Wilford Tournament on their minds during their Etobicoke game, for the next three days were given over to the Niagara tilt.

In their first game Milton was out-dubbed by St. Catharines 6-2. The game was tied at one and went into extra innings when St. Catharines took advantage of a Milton pitching change to score three. The loss pushed Milton into the consolation side of the draw.

In their second game the Lions managed an 11-0 drubbing of the hapless Dundas squad. Bobby Gatten was the star of the game for Milton with three massive round-trippers to coast seven RBIs.

Milton then took on Hull, Quebec, and claimed a 5-1 win thanks to a superb Shayne Ferrier pitching performance through seven complete innings. Macdonald had three RBIs and Marshall managed a pair of ribbons.

In the consolation semifinal Milton claimed a 10-5 win over Okawa with Macdonald going the marathon nine innings.

It was tied 5-5 after seven. Singles in the sixth by O'Donnell, Marshall, Gatten, E. Jr. and Houle finished off Okawa and sent Milton to the final.

The Lions ran out of gas in the final game, only coming up with one run.

Starter Marshall pitched well through five innings only giving up a pair of runs. Ferrier relieved but York managed another three to push the score to 5-1.
